Robert Halfon MP writes:

Dear Sheering Residents,

With Christmas just around the corner, I hope that everyone is looking forward to the celebrations. The villages are looking fantastic, with the Christmas lights now switched on.

As the nights are drawing in, I am conscious of the need to make sure everyone in Sheering feels safe. This month, I have been working hard with Essex Police to tackle antisocial behaviour. In a few days, I will be meeting with local shopkeepers to discuss how we can best eliminate this crime that is spoiling our wonderful community spirit.

In Parliament, I have also been busy furthering my campaign for a new hospital in Harlow. I successfully secured my third debate in the House of Commons, where I was able to draw attention to the desperate need for a new healthcare campus that brings together A&E services, GP provision, social care, physiotherapy and an ambulance hub. The Princess Alexandra building can no longer cope with the 350,000 people it sees each year and we have one of the busiest A&E departments in the country.

The staff at the Princess Alexandra Hospital NHS Trust are truly remarkable and they are working night and day, throughout the holidays. I want to see this hospital go from strength to strength, so I have launched my petition online for a new hospital in Harlow, and it would be great to have your support!

This Autumn also marked the Government's announcement of their spending plans. With tax cuts, a rise in the National Living Wage and the fuel duty freeze I have been campaigning for, this Budget is one for hard working families, helping to cut the cost of living. It is also one for social justice, with £20.5 billion extra a year for the NHS and and £2 billion more per year for mental health provisions in schools and A&E units.

As ever, Brexit discussions also continue and I am doing all I can to respect the vote of the people and ensure that Brexit means Brexit.

I hope you have a wonderful Christmas and a peaceful break.

News from the District Councillor for Lower Sheering

As I write this, the nights are drawing in and many of us will soon be casting our thoughts towards Christmas and I wish you all a happy and peaceful festive season. My thanks to Sheering News for once again giving me the opportunity to update you on District Council matters.

In my last article I mentioned the new dedicated team of 3 police officers, directly funded and tasked by the Council. They have now settled in as part of our new Community Safety Hub and I thought it would be useful to update you on their progress since July.

By way of context, The Community Safety Team does a first-rate job in keeping our residents safe within their communities. Working alongside safeguarding, antisocial behaviour and CCTV officers they identify problems and work together to support vulnerable victims. Their work has been greatly strengthened by the creation of the District Community Safety Hub. The Hub sees our Community Safety Team working alongside our three dedicated police officers on a day-to-day basis across a host of activities including:

- arresting offenders through targeted operations and patrols
- assisting council officers to serve court papers on high risk individuals
- supporting officers conducting property inspections around tenant issues
- issuing on-the-spot fixed penalty notices for anti-social behaviour

The Community Safety Hub is a powerful demonstration of continuing and innovative partnership working. I will make sure that the Hub is aware of, and where appropriate tasked with, the issues that matter to residents, visitors and businesses in Lower Sheering.

Speaking of local issues, one of the biggest sources of concern is the state of the roads, the maintenance and repair of which is the responsibility of Essex County Council (ECC). Taking Back Lane as an example, the Parish Council are in regular dialogue with ECC to get the potholes repaired effectively. Whilst busier roads will take priority, I shall continue to support the Parish Council to keep the pressure on ECC to attend to our local roads and pavements. Whilst it may be

of little consolation to those of us bumping along the minor roads, below shows the scale of ECC Highways work in 2017/18:

- resurfacing 3,010,000 square metres of road, (which is more than 12 laps of the M25)
- resurfacing 68.6 miles of footways
- repairing approximately 40,000 faults on streetlights
- last winter salting 225,834 miles of road, using 28,000 tonnes of salt
- cutting approximately 1000 miles of vegetation on Public Rights of Way

The District Council are currently negotiating the expansion of an arrangement to match funding on local Highways issues. This could help us address our local problems more rapidly and I will push for Lower Sheering to be at the forefront of any new initiatives.

Parish Council News Junction 7A

There has been no further information or feed back given to the Parish Council in respect of the proposed new junction. Any further information received will be advised to residents through Parish Council Meeting Minutes and future editions of Sheering News.

Epping Forest Local Plan

The final version of the Local Plan was submitted to the Secretary Of State For Housing Communities And Local Government on 21st September. We now await the outcome of the submission which is expected to be mid/late March 2019. All information in respect of the Local Plan is available on EFDC website, www.eppingforestdc.gov.uk/planningourfuture.

Handyman

I reported in the August edition of Sheering News that the Parish Council would be actively seeking to employ another Handyman to carry out various works around the Parish found to be needed outside the scope of the works currently carried out by Nigel Pearce. I am pleased to advise, that Mr Andy Crighton, following a successful interview commenced work with the Parish Council in September. Andy is known to many residents around the Parish as being the Site Manager at Sheering School, and we wish him every success in his additional role serving the community. To ensure a sensible management structure of the works around the Parish by both Andy and Nigel, Councillor Allan Turner has been appointed the responsible Councillor for Andy, with Councillor John Harrington remaining the responsible Councillor for Nigel. Should you deem any work necessary around the Parish, please contact the respective Councillors accordingly and not direct to Nigel or Andy.

Defibrillators

The purchase of two defibrillators has moved on and our Parish Clerk recently attended a training course on the types of defibrillators available, the operation and maintenance requirements of such equipment. The information obtained is quite detailed and to ensure we move forward in the appropriate manner, the Parish Council has set up a small sub committee to progress the purchase, installation and maintenance of this equipment.

Lower Sheering Community Facility

As I reported in the August edition of Sheering News, money towards this facility has moved forward by way of the section 106 agreements on the developments at Waterside Place and the Railway Inn. The money from the Waterside Place development, £24k, has now been received and paid by EFDC to Sheering Parish Council. The payment on the Railway Inn development, £50k, remained outstanding and EFDC entered into an agreement with the developer that the money could be paid in £5k instalments over 10 months commencing in May. However payments for May and June having been paid were not followed by payments for July to October. The Parish Council have however been assured that the missed payments will be made and future payments will be made in accordance with the agreement. We hope this to be the case.

Mobile Library

Councillor Christmas has pursued the lack of service of this facility in Sheering Village and has met representatives from ECC Library Services to look at the possible sites suitable for the larger library vehicle to park up in. With agreement of Councillor Bedford, the opportunity of the Library vehicle stopping in the car park area of the Cock Public House has been offered to the Library Services, and we are now currently awaiting their decision on acceptance of this offer or otherwise.

Community Speed Watch

Progress on this has been good since its conception, led by Councillor Crowdy. The equipment is now available and a training session on the use of the equipment, recording and reporting procedures was held on 23 October. Currently we have 16 volunteers, but only six were able to attend the training course. It is disappointing that from the number of complaints received through the Parish Council from Lower Sheering residents in respect of speeding issues particularly along Sheering Lower Road, that no one from Lower Sheering has volunteered to assist with the implementation of a speed watch programme in Lower Sheering. It is anticipated that the scheme will commence in Sheering Village mid/late November. If you are interested in joining the scheme as a volunteer, especially in Lower Sheering, please register your interest at sheering.community.speedwatch@gmail.com

Mini roundabout The Street

Following on from the speeding issues, the difficulties experienced by drivers negotiating this roundabout have been reported to ECC. And while ECC advise they are investigating the problems encountered and reported, the Parish Council has asked for assistance on this issue from County Councillor Anthony Jackson

in an attempt to expedite any proposed improvements.

Jubilee Bench

As a result of a serious accident along the Street adjacent to the shops, the Jubilee bench was destroyed. The Parish Council while pursuing an insurance claim for the damage, have taken the initiative to pay for a replacement bench while the claim is on going and I am pleased to report that that the new bench is now in place.

Litter Pick

On 18 August, a number of residents joined forces to form a litter picking brigade. This was the first of its type around the Village and following the purchase of six litter pickers by the Parish Council, this event proved a big success so much so, that more similar meetings may be planned for the future. Thanks to all of you who took part.

Sawbo Bus

Following the funding of £4k from ECC, the Parish Council has negotiated an extended service provided to residents of Sheering. The extended journey is for the bus to run from Sawbridgeworth via Hatfield Heath to the Street, turning round at the War Memorial for two return trips on Thursdays only. This will give residents with concessionary passes the opportunity to travel free to Budgens and receive a 10% discount on their shopping. It is hoped this service will expand to allow fare paying passengers to make use of the service.

Citizen Of The Year Awards 2019

It is that time of the Year again to start thinking about nominations for these awards. Please submit your nominations for both Citizen and Young Citizen Of The Year to the Parish Clerk no later than 15th March 2019. The awards will again be presented at the Annual Parish Meeting in April.



The Hundred Parishes Society

The index to the Society's new book refers to no fewer than eleven castles. All are shadows of their former selves, but many can still be seen and just a few may be visited.

Many were built soon after the Norman Conquest of 1066. These Norman castles are described as motte and bailey, consisting of a large mound of earth or rubble (motte) surmounted by a wooden or stone tower.

Alongside would be an embanked enclosure with additional buildings (the bailey).

A fine example of what a typical Norman castle may have been like exists at Stansted Mountfitchet. Although little survives other than the mound on which the original castle once stood, a wooden stockade and village have been recreated.

The mottes are still visible from Norman castles at Anstey, Great Canfield and Stebbing.

The parish of Castle Camps takes its name from the castle which dated back to Saxon times. Clavering castle's buildings were surrounded by a large ditch which can still be seen, adjacent to the churchyard.

Civil war raged in England between Stephen and his cousin Matilda from 1135 to 1153, a time known as The Anarchy which saw considerable castle building. Geoffrey de Mandeville, the Earl of Essex, swapped sides more than once. He built the castle at Saffron Walden. Some ruined walls still remain and they are Grade I listed, the finest surviving stone castle within the Hundred

> Parishes. De Mandeville also built the castle at Pleshev during the Anarchy. The large motte still remains. The present village of Pleshey lies mostly inside the outer bailey earthwork which is clearly visible along much of its length.



#CrimeNotToCare campaign - it's your responsibility!

We spend £190,000 on clearing up fly tipping across our district...money that could be spent on other services. But did you realise that it's not just the fly tippers that are liable to prosecution? We are all personally responsible for our waste and how it is disposed of.

Black sacks left outside the designated areas for refuse collection can constitute fly tipping as much as sofas, fridges, builders' rubble etc, which we trust to a third party to dispose of.

Duty of care

As residents we have a duty of care to ensure our waste is disposed of responsibly and doesn't find its way into the hands of rogue traders.

Just last month a Loughton man had to pay £1,500 in fines and costs because the person he asked to dispose of some cardboard fly tipped it. Our enforcement team traced it back to the man and he was prosecuted.

Check list

Here are a few simple checks to make before you enter into an agreement with someone to dispose of your waste:

Ask for their waste carrier number and vehicle details and contact the Environment Agency for a free instant waste carrier check



Ask for a transfer notice or receipt before your waste is taken away

Check where your waste is going. A legitimate waste carrier should not object to you asking these questions.

Make a note of who you have given your waste to, their waste carrier details and vehicle details.

You should never leave any waste such as an old washing machine or scrap

metal on your drive or in the street for someone to remove. They may not be a registered waste carrier and could take the bits they need and dump the rest.

You can

donate good quality items to your local reuse organisation or charity shop, or give items to someone who could make use of them.



Children and young people risk becoming involved in gangs

Independent charity Crimestoppers is highlighting that children and young people across Essex are at risk of becoming involved with gangs and the violence and abuse that often follows.

Many young people join gangs for protection or say that it makes them feel part of a family. It is not only young men. Young women are also recruited and routinely suffer sexual violence to 'control' them.

Crimestoppers charity wants to raise awareness of the issue and encourage Essex residents to speak up 100% anonymously to help keep young people safe. Our charity gives people the power to speak up, stay safe and stop crime by calling our professionally-staffed 24-hour UK Contact Centre on 0800 555 111 or by using the untraceable Anonymous Online Form www.crimestoppers-uk.org.

In a recent report from the Children's Commissioner for England, it was stated that the number of children involved in gangs could be as many as 46,000 and may be even higher.

Many young people associated with gangs speak of the dangers of gang membership. They can be transported to other parts of the country to deal drugs and be put into dangerous situations, such as carrying weapons and exposed to violence including knife crime. In Essex, the number of weapons offences last year rose by 50%.

Colin Dobinson, spokesperson for Crimestoppers in Essex, said "As gangs expand their networks into Essex, they need new members and actively groom vulnerable young people, many from 11 years of

age, sometimes even younger, to entice them into working for them. Gangs can start this process at school or parties where innocent children can provide them with potential recruits as they are less likely to have come to the attention of the authorities.

"I would urge parents and young people to visit the Fearless website (Fearless.org) which is a youth service, guided by Crimestoppers that develops effective anti-crime resources and advice for young people and their families. We know that many young people who are not involved in crime in any way may pick up information from school and friends on crime but are too scared to report it. Now Fearless provides them with a safe place to pass this information on – 100% anonymously. Always.

Youth professionals and teachers will also find many useful educational resources available on the site.

Caroline Wiggins, Chair of the Essex
Community Safety Network, said "Parents
must play a key role in alerting their children
to the risks. They need to make sure they
know what their children are doing, who they
are spending time with and look for any
signs that their children might be being
groomed or involved in gangs. I would
certainly encourage parents, their children
and anyone working with young people, to
visit the Fearless website and access
information that will help them prevent
further wasted lives and wasted futures".



I wonder what Christmas means to you? Is it about watching children, awake at ungodly hours, ransacking stockings or pillowcases for their treasure? Is it about eating 'all the food',



determined not to miss those seasonal goodies like mince pies, Christmas cake and Brussels sprouts, that we never seem to eat during the rest of the year?

Or is there something more?
