### The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations in Sheering

The weekend of the 2nd June to the 5th June will see the UK celebrating 70 years of Queen Elizabeth II's reign. Although the Coronation took place on the 2nd June 1953, Her Majesty ascended the throne on the death of King George VI on 6th February 1952. We are all invited to celebrate this unique occasion as our Queen is the only monarch to have reigned for 70 years. Bank holidays have been set from the 2nd - 5th June 2022 so that national and local celebrations can take place.

Across the UK, Town Criers are to proclaim the

beginning of the celebrations on the 2nd June at 2.00 pm. At 9.45 pm, more than 1500

beacons are to be lit, bugles are to sound, bagpipes played, and choirs sing.

There are many celebrations taking place locally, but Sheering is going to step up. A weekend of festivities will take place at Sheering Village Hall, in the Recreation area, at The Cock Public House and at St Mary's Church.

As the lighting of the beacons is to take place on Thursday 2nd June, we have selected

Thursday as our main community celebration day. Smaller street parties can be organised on the Sunday

when back roads can be closed to traffic.



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Dear Sheering residents,

The last month in Parliament has been dominated by the truly heartbreaking situation in Ukraine. I have been overwhelmed by the number of constituents who have made generous offers of support for the people of Ukraine - a true testament to the goodwill of the people of Harlow and the villages.

I have also been helping a remarkable family, who were stuck in Ukraine, to get back to Essex, which has drawn sharp attention to the true atrocities unfolding.

Since I entered Parliament in 2010, I have successfully campaigned for a fuel duty freeze, which has now been in place for 12 years - saving you £15 every time you fill up. However, the prices at the pumps are at a record high and it is fast becoming unaffordable for motorists, with the average family paying £16 more to fill their tanks compared to this time last year. That's why I have been ramping up my calls on the Chancellor to cut fuel duty or VAT on fuel and ease the burden on motorists. I am also campaigning to establish a Pumpwatch monitor to ensure that when wholesale oil prices fall, this saving is passed back to motorists with a fall in prices at the pump.

I further welcome the broader measures to cut

the cost of living. The National Living Wage has risen again and the Universal Credit Taper Rate has been reduced by 8%, meaning those in receipt are £1000 better off this year. I've also voted for a state pension rise of either 2.5% or by the same rate as inflation - whichever is higher.

I also continue to call for further strengthening of the NHS nationally and in the local area and I welcome the news that over 190 nurses and 60 doctors are now working at the Princess Alexandra Hospital compared to 2019. I am also looking forward to sharing more updates with you over the coming months in relation to the new building at PAH.

I remain in regular contact with dozens of Sheering residents about local issues, including speeding and planning matters, and will continue to work with you to ensure these matters are resolved as quickly as possible.

### Recycling News Book your slot to visit a recycling centre in a van



If you want to visit an Essex recycling centre in a van (including pick-up trucks and any vehicle towing a trailer with more than one axle), from 28 February 2022 you will need to book a slot in advance. Please remember, recycling centres only accept household waste.

There is no charge to book, but you need to make a booking each time you visit. When making the booking, you will be able to select the recycling centre you wish to visit. Once you have chosen your recycling centre, a calendar will appear displaying the time slots. Fully booked slots will be greyed out, and available slots will be green.

You can also view the capacity of each slot in the bottom right-hand corner of the time slot so you can see how busy each slot is. loveessex.org

### **Parish Council News**

I am pleased to advise that with the gradual improvement in respect of the pandemic, and the easing of restrictions by the Government, the Parish Council have continued with face to face meetings since the return of such meetings in July 2021. However, this is not a time to be complacent and we must continue to be cautious.

In the December issue of Sheering News, I reported that we had appointed our new Parish Clerk Siobhan Perrin following the retirement of Debbie Tennant. I am pleased to confirm that Siobhan has now successfully completed her probationary period, and following a recent review will now have that appointment formerly confirmed.

January is always a busy month for the Parish Council as it is when the Precept meeting is held in addition to the regular Council meeting. Council met on 5 January for the Precept meeting, and having discussed the various categories of expenditure in detail, agreed a Precept of £41,180 which has been applied for from EFDC. This figure being £1,820 below the last two years Precept figures.

There have been a number of issues presented to the Parish Council over recent months and I take the opportunity of highlighting some in this report.

#### The Queen's Jubilee 2022

The Parish Council formed a sub-committee to concentrate on organising this event within Sheering for the recognised Bank Holliday Weekend to celebrate this momentous occasion. Details of planned events are outlined elsewhere in this issue of Sheering News. However, as we approach nearer to the dates for the celebration, some things and timings may change due to various circumstances, so please keep a watchful eye on the Parish notice boards and website for final details.

### War Memorial Restoration.

The War Memorial being not only a focal point in Sheering, but also a very important and valuable monument in memory of past Sheering residents, has over time suffered deterioration in terms of its condition. The Parish Council has begun to look at what restoration works are required and possible areas of funding available for such works, in addition to financial support through the Parish Council. This task, which is not only time consuming, but also protracted, in respect of applications and qualification requirements through the recognised authorities who deal with War Memorials, and their restoration, and the obtaining of quotations for the work is being undertaken by Councillor Neil Marsden. We will keep you advised of progress made on this important task.

### Playing Fields & Equipment

Quotations for maintenance work on the existing equipment as identified from the annual inspection at both Sheering Village and Lower Sheering playing fields were obtained, and orders placed finally with Wicksteed. This work has now been completed. An order has also been placed with Wicksteed for the upgrading of the Lower Sheering playing field which will include a new slide and wet pour safety surfaces to the new and existing equipment. Regretably, the original dates for these works to be carried out have been moved back, but we are assured by Wicksteed, that the works will be carried out and completed by the start of the school summer holidays. Quotations are also being sought for the replacement of the chain link fencing and broken posts around the Lower Sheering playing field and it is anticipated that these works could start in late Spring.

### **Sheering Cars**

Problems have continued with the activities of Sheering Cars and their encroachment on Green Belt Lane at the rear of the site. Enforcement notices have been issued by EFDC to the occupants of the site, but appropriate action by them, called for under the enforcement notices has not been implemented. By way of assisting the residents who are immediately affected by this breach of use of the land, and who first applied to EFDC for appropriate action, and the fact that the enforcement notices were being ignored, the Parish Council have sort the assistance of our MP, Robert Halfon, who in turn has formerly raised the issue of the continued breach with EFDC. We are now advised that firm action will now be taken by EFDC to stop the breach of use on this land.

#### Tree Planting Scheme

As advised in the December issue of Sheering News, trees under this scheme have been ordered and are expected sometime in March. We have been very fortunate to have received a very favourable quotation from a local company for the planting of the trees, and we look forward to these being planted around the Parish to enhance our landscapes for a long time to come.

### **Annual Parish Meeting**

As you are aware, this meeting has not taken place for the last two years due to the pandemic and Government restrictions imposed on face to face meetings. I am pleased to advise that this meeting will take place this year in its usual format on April 27 and invitations to local organisations who normally attend will be sent out in due time.

In line with new NHS services, Village Pharmacy now offers free blood pressure monitoring to all over 40s. For patients with undiagnosed hypertension, they will also be able to offer 24-hour BP monitors

and once the patient returns the monitor, their data will be submitted to their GP for further diagnosis and treatment. Since the beginning of the pandemic, the Pharmacy has worked closely with Central Surgery and provided BP monitoring when requested. They will continue to provide this service for all patients.



### St Edward's Crown

St Edward's Crown is the centrepiece of the Crown Jewels of the United Kingdom. Named after Saint Edward the Confessor, it has been traditionally used to crown English and British monarchs at their coronations since the 13th century.

The original crown was a holy relic kept at Westminster Abbey,

Edward's burial place, until the regalia was either sold or melted down when Parliament abolished the monarchy in 1649, during the English Civil War.

The present version of St Edward's Crown was made for Charles II in 1661. It is solid gold, 30 centimetres (12 in) tall, weighs 2.23 kilograms (4.9 lb), and is decorated with 444 precious and



semi-precious stones. The crown is similar in weight and overall appearance to the original, but its arches are Baroque.


After 1689, it was not used to crown a monarch for over 200 years. In 1911, the tradition was revived by George V, and all subsequent monarchs (except Edward VIII, who was not crowned at all) have been crowned using St Edward's Crown. A stylised image of this crown is

used on coats of arms, badges, logos and various other insignia in the Commonwealth realms to symbolise the royal authority of Queen Elizabeth II.

When not in use, St Edward's Crown is on public display in the Jewel House at the Tower of London.

www.hundredparishes.org.uk. All routes can be download and printed. They include route instructions and information about the places you will pass. Each of the hundred parishes is included in at least one route and there are

walks for all abilities. The routes have been designed to take you through interesting places and lovely countryside.

Before setting off, you might like to check the relevant parish introductions on our website; there, you will find details of local tea rooms and pubs, etc. It's best to check with the pub to see if it will be open on the day and time that you will need it.

Most of our routes include footpaths or bridleways where good footwear will make life

more comfortable. A modest investment in a good pair of walking boots is recommended. Carry boot covers or plastic bags to put on before visiting a pub or church – or leave boots outside. Check the weather forecast and be prepared - with waterproof top, woolly hat or sunscreen.

Whether or not you are using one of the Society's routes, please be sure to follow the Countryside Code. I summarise a few points that are mainly common sense:

Respect everyone: Be considerate to those living in, working in and enjoying the countryside; leave gates and property as you find them; do not block access to gateways or driveways when parking; be nice, say hello; keep to marked paths.

Protect the environment: Take your litter home; do not light fires; always keep dogs under control and in sight; pick up your dog's poo; do not cause damage or disturb wildlife.



### Storm damage to the tower

By the time you read this, we hope the damage will have been repaired under insurance.

### Quinquennial (five-yearly) inspection

All Anglican churches must be inspected by a church architect every five years, and we recently received our report. We are relieved that in general the Church is in good order and delighted that the churchyard is "incredibly well kept" (congratulations to the churchyard team). However we do need to do a bit of work by the middle of the year. We expect that some slipped tiles on the tower roof may be fixed at the same time as the storm damage mentioned above. We also have to check out (and possibly fix) some blown rendering on the West side of the tower, and we are recommended to improve the precipitous access to the tower roof (see scary photo).



Estimates are not yet to hand, but we hope the work will be affordable from remaining Friends funds, given that we have not been able to hold any fundraising events.

### Churchyard team

In December the main job was to rake up

leaves, before leaving our footwear at the church room door



for a festive lunch together.



January work included starting to trim back the trees along the right of way next to the churchyard extension. The idea is to keep the path easily passable by cutting the overhanging branches to just

above head height.

### **Churchyard Extension**

Last time we wrote, the fencing was scheduled, and we thought we were nearly there. Ha! The fencing was duly done, and a new gate was installed. But we still cannot use the extension for burials! One of the (many) stipulations before we can ask the Bishop to consecrate the

land is title documentation which is produced by the Land Registry. The completed deed was dated 28 May 2021 so we assumed - wrongly - that it would be just a quick formality to get a copy of the related Land Registry document. We now hear that the Land Registry has a "significant backlog", and it could be "some months" before the documentation is completed. So we wait.



Fortunately, meanwhile, we found we could "make" a couple of additional grave spaces in the existing churchyard by removing a dead hawthorn, and we are also making plans for when the extension is eventually consecrated. The first burials will be in the corner nearest to the kissing gate on the right of way, and we will keep the grass trimmed in that general area. Ideas for the remainder of the area, before it is needed for burials, are being developed. We envisage that most of it will be left to grow long - perhaps with paths cut through it - and that this "wild" area will be cut just once a year, probably in the autumn once the seeds have set.

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### Popular St Clare Hospice's 10k Race set to take place this April


St Clare Hospice is once again staging its popular 10k road race, now in its 28<sup>th</sup> year, starting and finishing from the Hospice in

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#### **Hunsdon Mead Nature Reserve**

A superb flood meadow owned jointly by Essex, Herts & Middx Wildlife Trust.

This 68 acre of common land between the River Stort and the Stort Navigation is one of the finest surviving areas of unimproved grassland in Eastern England. The Hertfordshire & Middlesex and Essex Wildlife Trusts acquired it jointly in 1981. What to look for: The Mead provides a superb display of flowering plants. In April and May it is yellow with cowslips and marsh marigolds. As May gives way to June colours change continually, as plants such as yellow rattle, ragged robin, lady's smock, meadowsweet, bugle and many others flower in profusion. There are small colonies of green-winged orchid and adder's-tongue fern. Quaking grass and several uncommon sedge species are also present. All the typical butterflies of hay meadow occur and the day-flying small yellow underwing moth is also established. Mayflies and dragonflies are much in evidence. During the winter, when the Mead floods, large flocks of lapwing and golden plover come to feed along with other winter migrants. Accessible at all times. Between March and July please do not walk across or into the Mead itself until the hay is cut; trampling damages the plants and reduces the value of the grass as hay for the farmer. During this period please keep to the towpath or walk in single file along the permissive

path beside the River Stort. Directions - Follow the Stort navigation towpath from Roydon in the direction of Harlow - a walk of about one mile. The easiest parking is at Roydon station. Public Transport - Roydon railway station (Liverpool Street-Cambridge line) Did you know? For over 600 years Hunsdon Mead has been managed on the ancient Lammas system under which it is grazed by cattle or sheep after a July hay cut. It is this which accounts for its abundance of wildlife.

New funding helps St Clare Hospice to expand its new Wellbeing Hub services

St Clare Hospice

St Clare Hospice's new Wellbeing Hub has secured more than £5,000 funding. This

will help the Hospice to deliver a broad range of activities and improve the lives of local people living with a life-limiting illness. The BETA Charitable Trust recently donated £2,500 in support of the Hospice's Hub, and Active Essex has provided more than £3,000 towards the cost of running the Hub's specialist clinics and groups.

The Wellbeing Hub is helping people to live well with life-limiting illnesses and maintain their independence. It offers a range of community education and networking events, therapeutic groups and specialist clinics. By attending and taking part, people can come to terms with their diagnosis, find out how to navigate health and social care systems, plan for their own care, create new support networks and make friends.

St Clare Hospice is using some of the new funding to launch a series of education events which will be run on the last Thursday of every month at the Hospice. The first of these events will be on the Thursday 31 March, 1.30 – 3.30. The session will explore what hospice care is and how it can help people - especially if they receive an early referral. The sessions are open to local people (including service users and carers) and gives them a chance to learn and meet others who are in similar circumstances.

Sally Muylders, Community Engagement and Involvement Manager at St Clare Hospice, will be delivering the first of these Wellbeing Hub education events. She said, "We want to break down the barriers that exist for people accessing Hospice care. We know that early involvement can help someone in so many ways. It's not just about getting medical treatment for their conditions.' Sally adds, "St Clare Hospice is helping people to build support networks around the life events that they are experiencing. By giving people opportunities to connect with others, and share their life-changing experiences, St Clare Hospice is helping to prevent loneliness and isolation at the end of life."

Terry, from Harlow, has experienced the difference that the Wellbeing Hub can make. Terry, who has incurable lung-cancer, was invited to take part in one of the Wellbeing Hub's first Living Well programmes. The course gave Terry the chance to open up and share his experiences, which is helping him to cope with what he's going through.

"The course was very good," recalls Terry. "It brought you out of yourself and let you talk about things that are on your mind. I don't talk about these things with my wife or my family; I just don't want to burden them

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
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### Garage and Shed Security

Whilst most houses have adequate security what is often neglected is the shed or garage, "nothing much in there" I hear you say, "Just a garden spade and fork," but these are perfect tools for a burglar to use to get into your house. Adds insult to injury when the tool used to break into your house is your own, so give it some attention.

Garages and sheds by the nature of their construction and position especially when away from the house are always going to be vulnerable. Quite often the supplied locks provide just the barest minimum security and are easily overcome so always consider supplementing the existing locks with further locking systems both for the doors and items within.

On garage doors this could be by adding locking bolts to both sides of the "up and over door" or a garage door defender in the ground in front of the door. If you have a side door do not forget the security on this too.

With sheds coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door, use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock or a key operated mortice lock; do not forget the hinges and ensure they cannot be unscrewed. Consider using "Ground Anchors" or "Shed Shackles" to chain larger items such as ladders, mowers, and pedal cycles to (again good quality padlock and chain); keep chains tight so that they are not in contact with a surface it can be struck against.

Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or whitewash the windows to prevent prying eyes. Visibly security mark your property with your post code and house number as this reduces the value to the thief; you can register serial numbers free of charge at www.immobilise.com

There are also a number of commercially available security marking systems available that are suitable for a wide range of products and others for specific products. It is also worth adding security lighting and a shed alarm to the shed or garage. There are even alarms available that when activated call your mobile phone, these are relatively inexpensive, and available from most DIY/hardware stores.

If siting a new shed, position it within sight of rooms in the house routinely occupied. Products that are fit for purpose can be found by looking for the "Secured by Design" or "Sold Secure" logos, or on their websites: securedbydesign.com or soldsecure.com.



### From Revd Dawn Jewson

As you read this, we find ourselves close to the end of Lent: an approximately sixweek period leading up to Easter when, traditionally, we give something up in order to focus on the events of Good Friday and



Easter: Jesus' death and resurrection.

Chocolate, alcohol, sugar, TV and Facebook usually feature as 'things to give up' – but our Bishop has had other ideas. She wrote to churches back in the autumn asking us to avoid holding 'business' meetings during Lent wherever possible. It caused a bit of a stir. While most of us welcome a break from the inevitable meetings about our buildings, policies and finances, we could not in truth imagine how we would ever get our work done without the regular gatherings we've been used to. As I write, Lent is only just beginning, so I can't tell you how we've fared. But can I suggest that: We might have discovered that so-called 'essential' activities can actually wait. We might have found our mental health improving.

Our 'no meetings during Lent' policy could start to look attractive to other organisations we're involved with: school governors, parish councils, festival committees.

We might have discovered new things, new ways of being human. Our Archdeacon has

ways of being human. Our Archdeacon has been stepping out on a weekly series of walks around her 'patch' on Wednesdays during Lent, which we've all been invited to join. She will be

at Sheering Church at the beginning of her walk on 6 April, 9.00 am and the end of her walk on 30 March. We have so much beautiful countryside around us and many of us have found it a wonderful way to connect with our Creator.

We will of course have still been doing the things that make us 'church': worshipping in our churches, our schools, in homegroups and Messy Church; leading funerals and being alongside bereaved families, baptising babies and adults, helping couples prepare for their weddings.

Personally, I welcome this initiative wholeheartedly, and I encourage you to explore something like this in your own daily life, even beyond Lent. A new rhythm, just for a few weeks, could open the door to a whole new approach to the challenges of modern-day life. So whether it's a 10 minute break each day, away from our phone or other distractions, to just sit quietly, or a walk round the village, or perhaps reading something new and inspiring, my prayer is that we can all find ways of bringing much-needed space into our lives – not just for Lent, but for all time.
