Parish Council News

Meetings

Since my last report in the April edition of Sheering News, circumstances in terms of Covid restrictions had not until recently eased allowing face to face meetings.

Due to the restrictions, the Parish Council has not been able to meet until 23 June, this being the first meeting since December 2020. My last report outlined the problem of the Council not being able to meet in January for the usual Precept meeting, and I reported that the Council agreed to submit a Precept of £43K as was submitted for the year 2020/2021 in order that a Precept figure was submitted to EFDC to meet the required submission date. I am pleased to report that this amount was subsequently approved and paid by EFDC in April.

With the slight easing of restrictions, on 21 June, the Parish Council was able to meet on 23 June, observing social distancing and all other government requirements for holding such a meeting to carry out the long-awaited Precept meeting. The difference being that the meeting was for the purpose of allocating the Precept already granted to the various categories of expenditure.

It was also agreed that the expenditure for the year 2021/2022 would include the under spend from year 2020/2021, which was in the region of £22K as a direct result of limited activity generally through 2020 and the early part of 2021.

Following the meeting on 23 June, the Parish Council were able to meet on 30 June, the original date set for the June meeting. The agenda for this meeting included the election of the Chair and Vice Chair, elections that are usually held at the May meeting. I am pleased to advise that Councillor Richard Morgan and I were re elected as Vice Chairman and Chairman, respectively. Both Councillor Morgan and I thanked our fellow Councillors for their confidence in us in fulfilling these important roles and we look forward to their support during what we expect to be a busy year ahead.

The elections did not bring any change to these positions on the Parish Council. However, this cannot be said for other areas of the Council.

Parish Clerk

I have to report, that our Parish Clerk, Debbie Tennant has taken the decision to retire as Parish Clerk, a position she has held since her appointment in January 2013. Debbie's decision I know has not been an easy one for her to make, but on becoming a grandmother for the first time in April, and for the second time in July, her decision was a little easier enabling her to spend more time with her new grandchildren, a decision that was fully supported by all Councillors.

Debbie will be sorely missed not only by the Councillors she supported, but also by many members of the community who found her always approachable and a listening ear, when reporting any concerns they may have had around the Parish. I also take the opportunity of thanking Debbie personally for all the help and support she has given and shown me, during my term in office as Chairman which started three months into Debbie's appointment. It has always been very much appreciated and gratefully received.

The vacancy for a Parish Clerk has been advertised in the appropriate manner, and by the time you read this report, interviews for the position will have been held on 5 July and subject to those interviews, an appointment made with the intention of the new Clerk attending her first meeting on 28 July.

Councillor Resignation

Debbie's decision to retire was followed by Councillor Alan Jones's resignation. Since his appointment as a Councillor, Alan has been a very active Councillor, taking on the responsibility for the two playing fields and the management of the Council's handyman. Due to the workload imposed by these two particular areas of the Council's activity, the responsibility for the playing fields was subsequently passed to Councillor Bedford with the management and the organisation of the Handyman and his responsibilities remaining with Councillor Jones. Since being elected Chairman in 2013, on interviewing for a new Councillor, as and when required, I have always made the point that a Councillor's role is not about attending meetings, listening and then going home, it is about getting involved in dealing with the issues presented to the Council, and taking ownership of specific issues and seeing them through to a satisfactory conclusion in the interest of the those who we represent. On his appointment, Alan most certainly took this to heart, hence the work load he initially took on, and subsequently followed through with his management and organisation of the handvman.

I do therefore, on behalf of the Parish Council and I am sure many Sheering residents, extend our sincere thanks to Alan for all his hard work and commitment during his time in office which has been very much appreciated and we wish him well for the future.

The vacancy as a result of Alan's resignation will be advertised in the normal and recognised manner.

Handyman

Regrettably, we have also received the resignation of our Handyman, Ken Roberts. Ken was appointed Handyman on 1 November 2019 and has served the Parish Council since then in a most exemplary manner. Ken has decided to pursue his interests elsewhere, and again, on behalf of the Parish Council our thanks are recorded to Ken for all his hard work and commitment in his role and we extend our very best wishes to him for the future.

The vacancy for Ken's replacement will be advertised in the normal manner.

Residents' Issues

With the ability for the Parish Council to get back to meeting and business, we anticipate the coming months being a busy period for us all, taking into account the fact that for the last fifteen or so months very little has happened. The Parish Council will be concentrating on as many issues reported by residents as possible, and councillors have been requested to put those issues reported in order of priority so that what is considered the most important can be tackled first.

Playing Fields & Equipment

It is clear from the recent report from Wicksteed on the condition of our playing fields and indeed some of the play equipment, a lot of work is required to bring these areas up to standard. In terms of the Lower Sheering playing field, this will include some upgrading measures of equipment and safety surfaces. It is also planned to provide two memorial benches in memory of those residents who we

have sadly lost due to the pandemic: one in Sheering Village and one in Lower Sheering.

Tree Planting Scheme

During June, Councillors met with a representative of EFDC to discuss the tree planting scheme that is available to Parish Councils. Further details have now been received and Councillors Lesley Paine and Margaret Whitfield, will be looking into the scheme to establish locations and tree types best suited to enable us to further our interest and involvement in the scheme.

Waste Bins

Over recent months, and probably with an increase in walkers and dog walkers, it has become clear that there are insufficient dog waste bins in both Sheering Village and Lower Sheering. Additional bins including a replacement litter bin for the Lower Sheering playing field have been ordered and it is anticipated these will be in position in the near future. Please help to keep our community clean and tidy by making full use of all the bins around.

Speed Watch

Because of the pandemic, it has not been possible to operate our speed watch programme. Now that restrictions are easing, it is proposed to start this programme again and if you would like to be involved and want to volunteer to participate, please contact Councillor Mike Hayter whose details you can find on page 7 of this publication. I am sure, with the easing of restrictions, and the return to what we know as the norm, whatever that might be, and I hope that on reading this, it will all be a lot clearer following the Prime Ministers announcement on July 19, there will be a lot more issues to report on. In the meantime, stay safe, keep well and let's hope the months ahead will bring better and more enjoyable times for us all. Rodney Northwood



Our website and Facebook page continue to publish new material. We welcome new members and would also welcome participation and contributions from Sheering folk. There is not much point in being parochial! Sheering and Sawbridgeworth are close neighbours and our histories are very much intertwined. So if you think you have a project for us or a question, do contact us. You can do so through our website. That website is also the place

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The Crown Public House

The Crown Pub has finally closed it's doors. It was one of originally three pubs in Sheering Village. The Cock Inn and The Queen's Head were the other two. As the pubs were all on the

main street, Sheering was the place where you passed through for "a pint and a punch up." My mother never explained why!

The Crown Pub is thought to have existed since the 1700s and many locals passed through its doors. Indeed, the charabanc belonging to the pub transported many of them to the seaside. My earliest recollection is going through the back gate to the pub in Back Lane (as Crown Close was before the M11) to buy lemonade and crisps. The licensee at that time was Jim and his

Local Guide Books from Sheering Author

Local author Peter Aylmer used lockdown to good effect. Three local trails pass in or near Sheering, and with his wife Barbara he walked them all. He's turned his researches into three guide books, available through his website www.trailman.co.uk.

The Stort Valley Way is a 30-mile circular path around the countryside surrounding Harlow, passing through Lower

Sheering and along The Street. The 25-mile Forest Way links Epping Forest to Hatfield Forest, passing through Hatfield Heath. Longest of the three trails at 60 miles is the Three Forests Way. It's a circular route, adding in Hainault Forest to Epping and Hatfield, and like the Stort Valley Way runs along the River



Valley Way runs along the River Stort and through Lower Sheering.

It's easy to walk the routes in short stages indeed that's how Peter and Barbara walked them, with easy parking in the many small villages the routes pass through. Or, save them up for some longer summer time days out! All three guide books have colour photographs and professionally-drawn maps. Each is priced at £6 with free p&p.

Peter is also the author of the Cicerone Press guides to Essex and to London, also available through his website. I am sure there are some in the village whose grandparents frequented the pub. In those days, a pub was the

centre of the village community. Sadly the Crown pub will be a memory of the past.

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

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The Local Plan outlines proposed development across the District until 2033.

Main modifications

The consultation seeks views on changes being proposed to the 2017 Local Plan Submission Version which is currently under independent examination. These are changes that the Local Plan inspector considers necessary before the plan can be adopted. These changes are known as main modifications.

This main modifications stage follows the public examination hearings that took place between February and June 2019 and the inspector's initial advice of August 2019. This stage of consultation is limited to the changes (main modifications) proposed to the 2017 Plan and supporting documents that have informed these changes. It is not an opportunity to comment on parts of the 2017 Local Plan that are not proposed to be changed.

Supporting documents include the Sustainability Appraisal addendum and the 2021 Habitats Regulations assessment. Proposed changes

Aircraft over-flying Sheering

As a very long-term resident of Great Hallingbury, I was very used to aircraft noise and how to make the correct complaints when necessary.

Having moved to Sheering in 2017, I have enjoyed the quieter conditions here. I have got used to seeing aircraft veering east or west and just the few continuing south over the east part of the village.

On the 5th of June, I was greatly surprised to see and hear a noisy aircraft to the west of Church Lane. This prompted me to again contact the Airport Noise Complaints system. I have had a response to confirm that the aircraft was too low to depart from the examination and this is an opportunity for people to submit their views on the changes proposed to the plan during the examination process.

"It is important that people are clear on the nature of the modifications proposed at this stage. They do not include identification of any new sites for allocation for development compared with the 2017 Local Plan Submission version.

"I would also stress that there is no need to repeat comments already made as part of the examination because these are already being considered by the inspector.

The Local Plan is our highest corporate priority. Its adoption is critical in ensuring necessary development in the district is delivered in the most sustainable locations and is accompanied by the infrastructure that is required."

Consultation

Consultation is open for 10 weeks from 8 July 2021 until 16 September 2021. Upon launch full details will be available on the Epping Forest District Council website.

The quickest and easiest way to respond is via the online form but responses can also be made by email or post.

All responses will be collated and sent to the planning inspector for consideration once consultation closes and will be uploaded to the Local Plan website.

We will also be contacting people who have registered for Local Plan updates, statutory bodies such as Natural England, local town and parish councils and other stakeholders. Paul Stalker

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
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Update on the Churchyard Extension

This is our big news.

Negotiations have been concluded with Chelmsford Diocesan Board of Finance for the transfer of a strip of land, marked CDEF on the plan below, to extend the churchyard.



It measures 20 by 45 metres, similar to the nearby previous extension to the churchyard.

It is a requirement that the land should be fenced, and also that the closest burial plots must be located at least 10 metres from the nearby watercourse (the ditch beyond the hedge at E-to-F). As confirmed with Epping Forest District Council the fence between E and F will therefore run alongside the public footpath, 10 metres from the ditch. If necessary the overgrown hedge will be trimmed to keep the footpath passable. There are still a few conditions to be met before the ground can be consecrated for burials, including removal of the pesky hawthorn saplings that have sprung up everywhere, but we are greatly encouraged!

- Requires attention within the next 12 24 months
- Requires attention within the quinquennial period
- A desirable improvement with no timescale

Last time, largely thanks to funds raised via Friends of St Mary's plus grants, we managed to complete all but one item within the timescale. Congratulations to Ian Liddell who celebrated his 90th Birthday in June. Ian was born at Gladwyns Farm, his father, Jim, was a tenant farmer in 1927, buying the farm in 1946. In the past they had pigs, beef and 30,000 free range chickens as well as arable land growing various crops. At that time they also sold hatching eggs all over the country.

In 1950 they purchased Shrubbs Farm, now the home of Ian, his son Martin and his family. Their main business these days being arable, farming Iand in both Sheering and Hatfield Heath



Many of us wait anxiously for the outcome of the recent public inquiry into a possible increase in the passenger cap at Stansted Airport, yet the local community's love-hate relationship with Stansted Airport is only the latest in a series of significant aviation events that have occurred within the Hundred Parishes.

In a field at Standon Green End in the parish of Thundridge, a monument marks the spot where Italian balloonist Vincenzo Lunardi landed in 1784 after completing the first manned flight in England. He took off from London beneath a balloon filled with

hydrogen. In 1913, Bentfield Hucks was the first Englishman to loop-the-loop in his Bleriot aeroplane. He was born in 1884 in Bentfield Cottage,



Stansted Mountfitchet and thus acquired his unusual forename.

Duxford airfield, now the site of Imperial War Museum, Duxford, first became operational in World War I. Some of its buildings,

constructed by German prisoners-of-war, still stand. In 1938, Duxford was the first airfield to take delivery of Spitfire fighter planes. Frank Whittle flew regularly from here while he was developing ideas that eventually led to the invention of the turbojet engine just before the end of WWII.

Altogether, twelve military airfields operated within the Hundred Parishes during WWII. Andrewsfield, straddling the parish boundary between The Salings and Stebbing, was the first American-built base in Europe, becoming operational in 1943. Stansted was another American-built airfield. Thousands of Americans were based in this area; many never saw home again.

Many of us have enjoyed the relative peace that the Covid-19 pandemic has brought to our skies, in particular discovering the joy of walking in the countryside. It is sad that it has taken so many deaths to remind us of the quality of life that exists right here, without the need to fly.

Can you afford to throw £150 away?

Local authorities and fast food restaurants have come together to fight the scourge of people throwing litter out of their vehicle. Banners will be displayed at fifteen KFC and three McDonald's drive through restaurants, and take-away packaging will also be branded with "Can you afford to throw £150 away? Keeping Essex clean and tidy costs the tax payer over £17 million a year and with decreasing local authority budgets year-on-

year, the demand and pressure put on providing services such as street cleansing continues to rise. This year, the anticipated cost of keeping Epping Forest District clean and tidy will be around £1.4 million and picking up other people's litter is an expensive part of that. It is literally throwing



money away which should be spent on more important things," said Councillor Nigel Avey, Portfolio Holder Contract & Technical Services.

"We have seen the negative impact of litter on nature and wildlife, as well as in our oceans through programmes such as Blue Planet. A lot of that litter such as bottles, food packaging, straws, cans and cups, has been wind-blown from further inland, eventually turning up on our coasts. It is now even more vital we all do whatever is necessary to save our environment, protect our wildlife and eradicate the bad littering habit."

In Epping Forest District, we are asking everyone to act if they see someone throwing litter from their vehicle, by taking the registration number and reporting it to Epping Forest District Council by calling 01992 564000

Lateral Flow Tests

Rapid lateral flow tests help to find cases in people who

may have no symptoms but are still infectious and can



give the virus to others. The test usually involves taking a sample from your tonsils (or where they would have been) and from your nose, using a swab. You can get a result in 30 minutes. Available from gov.uk; test centres and pharmacies.

Beware of ticket fraud as restrictions ease.

Action Fraud is warning the public to take extra care when buying tickets for festivals and events online, as figures from the national reporting centre for fraud and cybercrime reveal almost £1 million has been lost to ticket fraud so far this year. Data from Action Fraud reveals that 1,085 reports of ticket fraud have been made so far this year, equating to an average loss of £850 per victim. Almost two thirds of victims (61 per cent) were aged between 20 to 49 vears old.

Action Fraud received 374 reports of ticket fraud in March this year – the highest number of reports received since March 2020 when lockdown restrictions were first implemented. Victims reported losing over £200,000 in March this year alone.

Pauline Smith, Head of Action Fraud, said: "Many festivals and events scheduled to go ahead as coronavirus-related restrictions ease have

already sold out – something criminals are more than happy to take advantage of.

"To avoid disappointment, only buy tickets from the venue directly, an official promoter or agent, or a well -known and reputable ticket site. Don't be duped by offers on secondary ticketing websites or social media, as this is often where criminals will advertise fake tickets to popular and soldout events. Remember, if a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is." One victim lost £200 after posting on Twitter asking if anyone had tickets for sale

for a concert. The victim was messaged by someone who claimed they had a number of tickets for sale and the suspect claimed they would transfer the tickets to the victim as soon as payment was received. The victim sent the payment via PayPal and once the suspect had received the payment, they blocked the victim. Another victim lost almost £250 after joining a Facebook group where they saw someone selling two VIP tickets to a festival. The victim contacted the person selling the tickets and was informed that they only accepted payment a digital wallet provider. The suspect claimed they would transfer the tickets to the victim as soon as payment was received but went on to block the victim and continued to advertise the tickets on the same group.

Another victim lost more than £3,500 after purchasing tickets for a rugby tour via what appeared to be a legitimate ticket website. The victim attempted to obtain a refund due to the uncertainty around travel but was unable to contact the company. The company has since been dissolved and a number of other victims have reported suffering a similar fate. Action Fraud has launched a national awareness campaign today (Monday 14 June 2021) to remind the public to take extra care when booking tickets online. as it is anticipated that increased demand for tickets following restrictions easing will lead to more unsuspecting victims being targeted.

Spot the signs of ticket fraud and protect yourself: -

- Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official promoter or agent, or a well-known and reputable ticket site.
- Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering your money if you become a victim of fraud.
- Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts

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enquiries@drobinson.co.uk www.drobinson.co.uk offering unbelievably good deals on tickets. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

 Is the vendor a member of STAR? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information: star.org.uk/buy safe.

Essex: E-scooter initiative launched to keep everyone safe.

On Monday 14 June Essex Police launched an initiative aimed at owners and riders of privately-owned e-scooters used in public areas. Our overarching aim is to keep everyone safe on our roads and footpaths. We want to educate owners and riders of privately owned e-scooters about the current legislation and, where necessary, take enforcement action especially where there is evidence of anti-social behaviour, other riding offences or wider criminality.

We must ensure those using privately-owned e-scooters do not pose a risk to the public or themselves due to their presence on public highways and pavements.

The use of privately-owned escooters in any public place is illegal.

By educating riders and encouraging them not to use privately-owned e-scooters in a public area, we hope that the number of e-scooters being used illegally, and any perceived antisocial behaviour, will be reduced. We recognise that a number of these scooters will be owned and ridden by young people, so we have taken the opportunity to write to schools advising parents of our plans. We're not trying to criminalise anyone, but please ensure you know the rules before buying your child an e-scooter.

Superintendent Sam Smith, who is leading this initiative, said:

"We have written to schools recently and asked them to raise awareness with parents about the laws surrounding private e-scooters. "Private e-scooters are permitted in law only to be used on private land, and are illegal if used on public land and we need to raise awareness of this legislation for everyone's safety. "We're not trying to target young people, but we need them to know that there are aspects to riding an e-scooter that could put them, or the wider public, at risk if the escooter is being ridden in a dangerous manner. "Privately owned e-scooters cannot be insured as they are not roadworthy and, therefore, they present a danger to the rider and the rest of the public." In the next few weeks, when we stop and speak to any young person riding a privately-owned e-scooter, we will speak to their parents to raise awareness of the law. Superintendent Smith went on to say: "We are aware that e-scooters are also used by adults who use them as a means of leisure and transport, but we will stop and speak to them too. We want to keep people safe and continue to deal with reports of e-scooters being involved in crime.

"Where there is persistent use of privately-owned escooters, or evidence of other offences, we will take appropriate enforcement action. This includes escooter seizure and riders being reported for driving offences."

Please stop and have a chat with your local Community Police Teams and ask them any questions you might have about e-scooters.

Revd Dawn Jewson writes:

'When I am weak, I am strong' What makes you feel weak, vulnerable? I broke my arm earlier this year, and apart from the pain (which lasted a LONG time!), one of the worst aspects was not being able



to drive for two months. Thankfully there wasn't much to drive **to** during that time, but I still felt the loss of independence acutely. Many of us have of course felt extremely vulnerable during the pandemic, and with good reason. That's why we've kept our Zoom service going every Sunday even when we were able to return to worshipping in our church buildings. Zoom has given us an invaluable alternative church for those who want to be as safe as possible.

People (including churchgoers) often think the reason we go to church is to gain some kind of strength – to be fuelled up and gain the power to change the world. So, it was a bit of a surprise in church the other week to come across a Bible reading in which St Paul actually **boasts** that he is weak! He had experienced the church in Corinth saying mean things about him like 'in person he is unimpressive and his speaking amounts to nothing'. (I think I'd feel pretty weak and vulnerable if I knew people were talking about me like that!) So, he decided to focus on the less powerful side of himself. His reasoning was that God had told him 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made strong in weakness'.

Put it another way: when we're at our most vulnerable, that's when we are at our least arrogant and self-sufficient. And God loves it, because we rely on him more and more, and that draws us closer to him. So, if you're struggling at the moment, with whatever is making you feel inadequate or vulnerable, it might help to remember Paul's words: 'When I am weak, I am strong'. God wants to tell you, quite simply 'You are enough. I love you'. Don't we all need some of that? With my love,
