A Tribute to Michael ('Mike') Morgan

The life of Michael Morgan, of Back Lane, Sheering, who sadly died of Covid-19, aged 81 years, on 7 October, was celebrated last month in a moving funeral service in Great St Mary's Church,

Sawbridgeworth. The Morgan family moved to Sheering in 1981 following 'Mr Morgan's' appointment as a general surgeon with a special interest in breast cancer at Epping and Harlow hospitals. He soon established himself not only as a highly skilled, much loved and respected

surgeon, but also as a colourful local character with many other interests. People have remembered him as larger than life, a force of nature, vibrant, exuberant, kind, warm, generous, fun, a person who was interested and knowledgeable about so many things, who liked to talk to anyone and everyone about anything and everything and treated everyone the same. A local legend.

Mike was born in Swansea, South Wales and remained a passionate Welshman, particularly when it came to rugby. With his two older brothers and younger sister, the family lived in Pontardulais – 'the Bont' - a close knit community just outside Swansea. He was, of course, a war baby, so for the first few years of his

life his father was away in the Army and the family must have been all too aware of the repeated heavy bombardment of Swansea.

At the age of about seven he became seriously ill with meningitis. The miracle of penicillin had just become available



and probably saved his life, albeit given in those days by twice daily lumbar punctures to deliver it to the spine. He always winced at having to perform

this procedure on a patient, but the whole experience must have influenced his future choice of career.

Although they spoke English at home, some of Mike's schooling was in Welsh. He went to Gowerton Grammar School, Swansea, where he excelled at sport – particularly rugby and tennis – and played the cello. When the family moved to Lampeter, he transferred to Lampeter secondary school. He studied medicine in Cardiff, where he played rugby for Cardiff Medicals and took on management of the student bar. He apparently brought it back into profit and undercut the local wine merchants to such an extent they complained about losing their consultant clientele!

Dear Resident,

I am writing to wish you and your family a very Merry Christmas, a Happy New Year and to reflect upon what has happened in 2021. This has been another very tough year for our community. However, I have every hope that, thanks to the remarkable vaccination and booster programme, next year will be a much brighter one and I want to just explain why I think that may be the case.

As your MP, I work hard every day for Sheering and I want to update you on the work I have done to deliver on my pledges.

Championing Education and Apprenticeships
My passion in politics has always been
championing education and apprenticeships. In
the Budget, the Chancellor increased per pupil
funding for every pupil in our local schools by
record amounts, something I have been
campaigning on for many years. He also
extended incentives for businesses to employ
apprentices and increased the Skills budget by
42% - this will mean many more young people
in Sheering being able to get an apprenticeship
and climb the educational ladder of
opportunity.

Cherishing our village and protecting our environment

Despite much work this year from our local Councillors, speeding in the village is still all too common. I have met with the police and our County Councillor to fight for more action to be taken and I will continue to work hard to see that action clamp down on this speeding. I also know many residents have concerns about the Local Plan and overdevelopment. I have made representations to the Council on behalf of everyone who has contacted me about this and I would encourage any resident with concerns to contact me directly so that I can raise it with the Council.

Making our streets safer

I have voted on a number of occasions in Parliament to ensure that the sentences criminals receive truly reflect the crime they committed. For too long, the system has enforced weak sentences that do not allow for justice to be served and I am pleased that will now change.

Furthermore, I've worked hard to ensure that victims have the support they need, and I'm pleased that with the new Domestic Abuse Act and the Government's new Beating Crime Plan, victim support will be placed at the heart of the criminal justice system.

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We also need more police on our streets with more powers to tackle crime. That's why I've lobbied and voted for more funding for the Police, and I'm pleased that we now have over 600 more police officers in Essex - with stronger police powers - and many more to come. I'm working hard to ensure our community gets our fair share of officers to tackle anti-social and dangerous behaviour.

Cutting the cost of living

The pandemic has presented unprecedented financial worries and I have lobbied the Government to introduce measures to cut the cost of living for Sheering residents. I'm pleased that the Chancellor heard those concerns and acted in the Budget to:

- Cut taxes for lower earners by cutting the taper rate on Universal Credit from 63% to 55%. This will uplift wages, alongside the uplift in Work Allowance to ensure work always pays and benefitting thousands of families in Harlow.
- Increase the National Living Wage to £9.50 an hour. This equates to around £1,000 per year salary increase for full-time workers.
- Freeze fuel duty for the twelfth year saving the average driver £15 every time they fill up. Reform of alcohol duties and freeze business rates to cut the tax and support our brilliant local pubs.

Strengthening our NHS

The plans for our new hospital are continuing to develop and I'm delighted that since I was reelected in 2019, we have 191 more nurses and 63 more doctors working at the Princess Alexandra Hospital. This is thanks to the record funding for our NHS with tens of billions of pounds to increase frontline funding, tackle the backlogs, recruit more doctors and nurses, and ensure every resident can see their GP quickly and without issue.

I will continue to work hard to secure more funding and ensure that funding truly reaches the frontline so that every resident receives the care that they need.

2021 has been a very busy year for our community and, for the reasons I have outlined, I have every hope that next year will be an even better one. I will continue to work hard for Sheering and I look forward to seeing you soon.

the car park entrance bringing them to the verge of tears!



Using the right COVID-19 test: Some local GPs have expressed concern about people with COVID-19 symptoms who are relying on the results of 'rapid' or 'lateral flow' tests to diagnose whether they have COVID-19. If you're experiencing Covid-19 symptoms, such as a temperature, a new cough or a loss of sense of taste or smell, should book a PCR test at your local centre straight away, and isolate until you have the results. If your child demonstrates any of these symptoms, please also do the same. If you do not have any symptoms of COVID-19, then it is appropriate for you to take regular rapid lateral flow tests, and it is recommended that you do so twice a week. There is a chance that you can still catch and pass on COVID-19 even if you're vaccinated, with about one in three people not displaying symptoms even when they are infected - taking regular tests can help you stop spreading the virus unknowingly. Please selfisolate if you receive a positive result and arrange a PCR test immediately to confirm these.

Parish Council News

Richard Morgan MBE

It is with great pleasure, I start this report with reference to our District and Parish Councillor, Richard Morgan, who after a delay of some 18 months has been awarded his national honour.

The Press release from Epping Forest District Council reads:

"After a delay of more than 18months, veteran councillor Richard Morgan MBE has been presented with his national honour at Windsor Castle, by HRH The Princess Royal.

Services to the community

The Honour of Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire is in recognition of his services to the community

After 38 years as an Epping Forest District Councillor, Richard Morgan is still one of the most active and influential local members He has played a very active role across various committees culminating in cross-party support in his election to the role of Chairman of Council in 2004

He was elected to the District Council in 1983 and throughout that time has served, and represented local people in Morton, Hastingwood, Matching and Sheering Villages.

Richard also sat on a number of outside bodies and organisations including Stansted Airport Community Trust Fund; Fawbert & Barnard's Educational Foundation; Stansted Airport Consultative Committee (Deputy Chairman); National Housing and New Town Planning Council; Sports Centre Management Committee Ongar & District Community Association and Local Councils Liaison Committee.

A gentleman in every way

One of his nominators said of Richard: He isa gentleman in every way and is always willing to help the local community in whatever way he can.

During his year as Chairman he supported St Claire Hospice (Hastingwood), Chigwell Riding Trust, Cancer Research UK and the Air Ambulance based at North Weald Airfield." Two years after my appointment as Chairman of Sheering Parish Council, Richard was appointed Deputy Chairman, and it has been an honour and a privilege to have had him at my side for the last 6 years plus, and for his support, guidance and the benefit of the wealth of experience he brings to Parish Council meetings. It is very gratifying that Richard's contribution to the community has

been recognised at the highest of levels and is an accolade well deserved.

On behalf of the Parish Council, I extend our sincere congratulations to Richard.

Parish Clerk

As I reported in the August edition of Sheering News, our Parish Clerk Debbie Tennant took the decision to retire. The advertising and recruitment process started in June when the Parish Council was able to resume face to face meetings. With the first of interviews set up for the 5th July, these were subsequently cancelled due to the candidates, all for different reasons withdrawing their applications. The post for Parish Clerk was again advertised, and I am pleased to confirm that following a successful interview, Siobhan Perrin who is a local resident and resides in The Street was appointed and attended her first meeting in September. We wish Siobhan every success in her new appointment. I also record the Parish Councils appreciation to Debbie who continued to carry out most of her duties during the prolonged recruitment process, and finally took up her retirement at the end of August.

New Councillor

Following the resignation of Councillor Jones, I am pleased to confirm, that having advertised the vacancy, John Harrington was appointed a Councillor in August. This was a return to the Parish Council for John who in the past had served Sheering as District Councillor for Lower Sheering, a Parish Councillor and was Chairman of the Parish Council for eleven years, preceding my appointment in 2013, following John's decision to step down. John brings to our meetings a wealth of experience gained over a period in excess of some thirty years serving as a Councillor, and in welcoming John back, we look forward to his help and support in the many issues facing us in the coming months.

Planning

There have been a number of planning applications passing through the Parish Council during the period with a significant number being for Lawful Development. The two most significant applications however have been that for the erection of a 5G telecommunications mast, proposed to be erected at the junction of The Street and Crown Close. The Parish Council opposed

this application, along with a number of residents, and the latest information we have is that this application has been rejected by FEDC life and the benefits this exercise we the area. The second most significant planning issue was the response to the Main Modifications outlined in the amended Local Plan which showed the area of Green Belt land which extends the East of Harlow Strategic Master Plan up to the motorway bridge at Sheering. The Parish Council, launched a leaflet drop to residents in Sheering Village to lodge their own objections to this proposal, and in conjunction with residents objections, the Parish Council submitted an extensive detailed objection against the proposal, which if approved would go a long way towards Sheering losing its Village status, a move that was advised against in the original Local Plan document. The current status is that the period for lodging objections has now closed, and these are now being considered by the Planning Inspector. We await the outcome of the Inspectors decision.

Playing Fields & Equipment

Quotations for maintenance works and the upgrading of the Lower Sheering playing field have now been received and comparisons made, with decisions taken on moving these works forward. It is expected that orders will be placed for these works immanently, but with lead times of anything up to 10 weeks being quoted for new equipment and associated works, the upgrading of Lower Sheering playing field is not likely to start until early in the new year. This hopefully will coincide with some dryer weather so avoiding or limiting damage to the playing field itself.

Tree Planting Scheme

The tree planting scheme as outlined in the August edition of Sheering News, has moved on and a number of trees under the scheme have been ordered, for planting in both Sheering Village and Lower Sheering. The trees are expected to be available February/ March, so please keep an eye on the notice boards when we will be looking for volunteers to assist with the planting.

Astro Turf

Many of you will have noticed that a large area of the Astro Turf along the Street adjacent to the Village sign has now been removed. This area has now been seeded with a variety of wild flowers which we hope will be a colourful area late Spring early Summer attracting wild


life and the benefits this exercise will bring to the area. All the necessary work in transforming this area has been carried out by volunteers from both the Village and Lower Sheering under the watchful eye guidance and assistance of Councillor Paine.

Waste Bins

At long last, the additional dog waste bins have now been delivered and fixed, one along the Street and one in Four Acres. The badly deteriorated waste bin in Lower Sheering playing field has also been replaced In concluding, thankfully, we are in a better position this year, than we were this time last year, but as we all know, the pandemic is not over and we must continue to be careful. Diwali and Christmas went ahead as planned. We were unable to hold our Christmas concert/coffee morning, however, we still managed to raise £216.00 from our Tea-Towels, £256.00 from our Christmas raffle, £41.00 from the toy and book sales and a £40.00 donation was received from one of the children's grandparents. We would like to thank our parents for all their support. Back in January 2021. The pandemic was at a critical stage with Covid 19 cases increasing at a phenomenal rate, to this end many of our parents decided to keep their children at home. We remained open for all other children but our numbers were significantly reduced, having between 4 and 8 children in per day. Angle and I were able to create a rota that enabled staff to have time at home with their own children to help with home schooling and we even got a day off each as well. Due to our low numbers and a problem with the heating in the village hall, we ran the pre -school from the small hall where it was easier to maintain a constant temperature. This was made more difficult with the incredibly cold winter that we encountered. Pre-school continued to take on the responsibility of cleaning the hall, kitchen and toilets and we would like to take this opportunity to thank all the staff for their help in this matter and for taking it in turns to remove recycling and rubbish from the hall which they are still doing to this day. We went back to uploading

our activities to the children's online learning journeys which enabled us to stay in contact with our children and parents. Some of the activities we enjoyed were celebrating new year and Chinese new year. After half term we returned to pre-school, still running from the small hall. By the second week we were back to working at full capacity with all staff and children and running from the large hall. At this time we welcomed two new children to pre-school, iust in time to celebrate Mothering Sunday. Unfortunately we were unable to hold our Easter concert/ coffee morning and so missed out on crucial fundraising. On returning after our Easter break we welcomed another eight children and their families to pre-school and enjoyed celebrating Father's Day and activities linked to our topic which was 'Healthy Minds and Body'. It was not possible to hold our annual sports day with all the children invited into preschool and all the parents watching, so we held a mini version instead where we were still able to have straight running races and over under and through races. We enjoyed our annual activity of watching caterpillars grow and build a cocoon but unfortunately at the very end of June a member of staff contracted Covid and we were forced to close for two weeks. Within five days myself and Angie had it too. I had the job of keeping the butterfly cocoons until the butterflies emerged, then I released them in my garden, videoing the release and putting it on the children's learning journeys. We were able to return to pre-school for the last week of term,

once again filming our leavers' concert. We said farewell to 19 children, ten of whom moved on to Sheering Primary School and we wish them all happiness in their new schools. We had a donation of £150 from one of our leaving families and a huge thank you goes out to them. Returning after the summer

holidays, we welcomed 16 new children and their families to pre-school, we hope they all enjoy their time with us. Our topic this half term was 'All About Me'. This is a great topic to start our Autumn term with as it helps us to get to know our children better. We also incorporated Phonics with a letter of the week. 

Continued from Front Page Early on he developed a fascination with anatomy and pathology and decided to pursue a career in surgery. He moved to London for his specialist training, based at surgeons in this country and abroad. St Bartholomew's and The Royal Marsden Hospitals. He spent a year on secondment worked with. He teased them, gave them at the prestigious Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York which provided him with superb further specialist training and experience, although it always bothered him that there Mike's influence extended outside Harlow. were armed guards at the door and patients had to show their credit worthiness before being seen. When he came to Epping and Harlow in 1980 he quickly established a nationally recognised breast cancer unit. He was an early pioneer of breast cancer screening and less disfiguring surgery for cancer patients. He contributed to research into new treatments for breast cancer and their the hub of an extended family. His four effective use. And he established a charitable fund which helped patients, allowed the introduction of specialist breast nurse counsellors, and later funded ground-breaking scientific research in Harlow.

To Mike, medicine was a vocation. He was prodigiously hard working, with huge, but efficiently run clinics. When he first arrived here, there were only two surgeons. They were on call every other night and every other weekend. He insisted his junior staff call him for any significant problem or whenever they felt out of their depth. As a result, he frequently went into the hospital in the middle of the night, but still appeared at 9 o'clock the next morning for the routine work of the day. He was so much more than a skilled surgeon however. He was interested in his patients as people and their interests came first. Many were young women, some not much older than his daughters. and he was not afraid to give them a hug after he had broken bad news to them about their diagnosis. Many a patient wept only two buttons: stop and go, flat out or on his shoulder.

He also bonded with his junior staff and took their training very seriously. He expected them to know their patients well, Commander. He covered for the leave of but as long as they did and were diligent

and honest, he would back them to the hilt. For this he received loyalty in abundance back. It is no coincidence that many of his junior staff went on to be His support extended to the nurses he nicknames that perhaps today would be thought inappropriate, but respected them and encouraged them to further their careers.

For many years he represented the UK on the international committee responsible for grading all cancers. On retirement, he received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the World Health Organisation for this work and was added to the WHO Roll of Honour.

Outside work Mike was firstly a family man. He and wife Jane's home became daughters are unanimous that, while he may have often been pre-occupied with work, he was never a boring Dad. He was immensely proud of them all as they grew into independent, articulate, caring and witty young women, and of his seven grandsons with each of whom he



developed a bond special. Mike still managed to fit in numerous hobbies all of which he pursued with gusto. He was not a man to do things by halves. It was a family joke that he had asleep.

While still a student, he joined the Royal Naval Reserves, rising to Lieutenant permanent medics in some far flung

places. Early on he took on the challenge of an arduous training course with the Marines. He had not anticipated a real life incident in which, with absolutely no experience and in heavy seas, he - a man afraid of heights - had to be winched from a helicopter onto a merchant ship which was rising and falling in the swell, to airlift a seaman with appendicitis.

He enjoyed company. He quickly found there was a local 'Taffia' in the area. some of whom he had known in Wales. From there his social life expanded. He gathered friends of all ages wherever he went. He loved pub banter - not to mention the beer - and entertaining at home.

He continued to support Welsh rugby, regularly attending the 'Six Nations' games. He ski-ed and sailed, and collected fine wines. And he loved music.

especially opera and large choral pieces, played of course at full volume. He was a green-fingered gardener. Not of the mowing lawns, weeding and neatening edges variety: he loved plants and was constantly on the lookout for unusual and exotic ones. Some of his fads passed, but not his fascination with orchids, which remained his favourite flower. His vegetable plot - and for a time, his High Wych allotment - always included vegetables which he thought no-one else would be growing. He would appear on friends' doorsteps with his surplus produce, if

only for a tortoise. And he loved the competition of the Sheering Flower and Produce Show.

He kept bees, regularly being called upon to rescue swarms from inaccessible places in other people's gardens. His honey was much-coveted.

He was a Pisces, so a keen fisherman. At a very young age he would go off on his own for the day, rod in hand and sandwiches in his pocket. He went


salmon fishing in Scotland every year, the

last time being just this last August; he was incredibly proud to have caught one of the largest salmon ever caught on his 'beat' on the River Deveron. To this day there is a



-out with his name on hanging in the fishing hut. Fishing holidays were the only ones for which he spent weeks

> sorting and packing his gear and set out ahead of time. His main retirement project, however, was a sadly neglected classic Bentley car which he had bought at an auction. He took it apart and painstakingly restored it over many, many months. Over the following years 'The Duchess' as she was now called became a familiar sight in Sheering and



Everyone has stories about Mike which will no doubt be told for many months and years to come. For now, he leaves a massive void, but many, many people have reason to be grateful for all that he packed into those 81 years.

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


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The Hundred Parishes Society

As 2021 enters its final month, we anticipate seasonal celebrations to brighten the shortest days of the year. The ancient tradition of decking our houses with garlands of fresh green holly branches reminds us of the continuity of life, bringing us cheer when the days are short.

On reaching the age of 20, female holly trees bear red berries on branches covered with

prickly shiny green leaves which can be cut to make decorative wreaths. Such wreaths featured in midwinter Celtic and Roman celebrations as symbols of good fortune, a tradition that continues thanks to the intervention of a local man, William Winstanley (1628 – 1698).

During the Commonwealth which lasted from 1649 to 1660, the Puritans under Oliver Cromwell proclaimed that it was illegal to celebrate Christmas, banning frivolities and feasting on mince pies. Winstanley, who lived

in Quendon, believed in celebrating Christmas as a time for sharing joy, fun and good fortune with others. After restoration of the monarchy in 1660, using his influence as a writer, he encouraged a return to the seasonal merrymaking which we still enjoy today.

Holly trees were frequently planted near houses to ward off a lightning strike; interestingly scientific research has revealed its spiky leaves can act as miniature lightning conductors! Holly also grows in hedges or as a shrub in woods where its berries provide

> nourishment for blackbirds, thrushes and wood mice. Its dense branches provide secure nesting sites. Deer and rabbits will eat its nutritious leaves.

> Today, many homeowners plant variegated forms of holly to provide interest in their gardens and they can select a mixture of foliage to make seasonal decorations. Yew is another evergreen with red

coloured fruits (loved by birds and squirrels), but as its leaves are poisonous it is less suitable for indoor decorations.

News from The District Councillor for Lower Sheering

Thanks to Sheering News for once again allowing me the space to update you on District Council matters.

The alterations to the Civic Offices in Epping are now complete. The addition of a Community Hub to host voluntary and other organisations within the new shared space should bring real benefits to service users. Other offices within the building are now being offered to outside businesses at commercial rent. The income this generates should allow us to continue to keep your council tax amongst the lowest in Essex.


The major planning issue to arise over the last few months has been the Consultation on the Epping Forest Local Plan. The Local Plan is the blueprint for future development in the District for years to come and it is vital that all views are taken into consideration. We can all see the evidence of the extensive and ambitious plans for the expansion of Harlow towards our border and of the progress being made with the construction of the new M11 junction.

Both the motorway junction and the proposed new hospital are within the Lower Sheering ward and I need to make my own position clear. I am in favour of the new hospital because we have the opportunity to gain a world class medical facility on our doorstep whilst freeing up the brownfield site of the decrepit old hospital for much needed housing and business use. I had no say in the siting of the motorway junction, but I recognise the need to improve infrastructure to support the new highly skilled and well paid jobs that are being attracted into Harlow by global pharmaceutical, research and technology companies.

What I cannot support is the proposal to lose the rest of the green belt area to the North of the new junction for housing. This effectively will connect Sheering to Churchgate Street and goes against one of the most important reasons for the retention of green belt land, which is to separate settlements and villages so that they retain their individual identities. The additional loss of historic and important wildlife habitats makes the proposal even harder to accept. Such increasingly scarce resources should be nurtured, not destroyed.

I know from your phone calls and e mails that many of you feel the same and I have submitted my own response to the planning inspectors along the lines above. Please be assured that I do not want to see Lower Sheering become a suburb of Harlow and I will continue to fight against any plans that will lead to that happening. Kind regards,

Minor Injuries Unit Herts and Essex Hospital

The Minor Injuries Unit (MIU) at the Herts and Essex Hospital offers an alternative to A&E attendance for patients with minor injuries. The MIU is an 'open access' service that can be used by both adults and children over two years old who have sustained a minor injury. There are no appointments, so patients are seen in order of time of arrival unless their condition is more serious, for example a wound with uncontrolled bleeding or a dislocated joint or an obviously badly broken bone. Our aim is to see you as soon as possible but you will appreciate that sometimes several patients arrive at the same time, so some waiting time is inevitable.

The MIU is open Monday to Friday from 9.00 to 4.30 and can treat the following conditions and issues:

Minor impact injuries; Sports injuries; Dressings and stitches; Fractures; Lacerations; Penetrating foreign bodies; Burns; Whiplash; Abscesses; Bites and stings

We are now offering more consultations by telephone and video conferencing. Please call the MIU before you visit on 01279 827450 so that we can advise you on whether you need to be seen in person or whether we can help you by telephone or video conferencing. In many cases our team may be able to offer you advice without you needing to come to the hospital at all. If you do attend in person, please expect to be asked to

wait in your car or outside the building until one of our team can call you to discuss your care. We will only ask you to come into the MIU if we cannot advise you without seeing you face to face. Patients who have used our video conferencing facility tell us it is very easy and helpful for conditions where advice can be given remotely. To Contact the Service: Tel: 01279 655191 (This number will take you to the Herts and Essex switchboard, who will then put you through to the Minor Injuries Unit.)

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Remembering those loved and lost with St Clare Hospice's 'Light up a Life' memorial service

Tommy is one of our young supporters (age 8) whose dad (Wayne Hann) was cared for by our nursing teams when he had cancer and who died aged 38 last October.

Tommy, who lives in Harlow, said: "Daddy stayed in St Clare Hospice's Inpatient Unit for two weeks before he died. It was during COVID so I would go to see him after school. I was staying with my Nanny and Grandad, as Mummy stayed by Daddy's side at the Inpatient Unit. Mummy always says that me and Daddy were two peas in a pod – we had the same hobbies and always did everything together. I only got to spend seven years with Daddy, but he was – and still is – my best friend and my hero. We made the best memories together in the time that we had. This year will be my second Christmas without Daddy. I miss him so much. I know there are other families who will also be

missing people who have died too."

Tommy and his Mum, Leah, will attend one of the three services being held at St Clare Hospice, Hastingwood. They will also take part in the new children's art and craft activity, which is being held directly before each service and run by the St Clare Child Bereavement Team.

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


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Christmas recycling

The Library Management System (LMS) has also been upgraded giving library users easy and accessible ways to use library services. Future developments will include a new library platform, and a 24/7 renewal line.

The new system is also compatible with most mobile devices and via the app. which can be downloaded

via Apple and Android App stores.

Essex Library of Things Some unusual things are appearing in some of our libraries items of



household equipment which you'll be able to borrow. Tools for home repairs and decorating, kitchen appliances, tents, sports equipment, musical instruments and gardening tools will all be available for hire.

The Essex Library of Things is

a pilot scheme set up as part of BLUEPRINT for a Circular Economy. It's affordable, it cuts down on clutter, it's good for the planet and it's safe. You can place a hold on any item in the collection, as you would with a book. There are currently five libraries from which you can collect -Chelmsford, Clacton, Great Parndon, Laindon and Witham - and the mobile libraries as well. We hope to add more libraries as the project develops.

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

I was really struck by this quote from Henri Nouwen, especially when we are entering a time of deliberate preparation for the season of Advent, meditating and reflecting with expectation of Jesus' first coming, the coming of the Kingdom and with it, divine judgement and gaining a real experience of prayerful hope of a renewed world to come.

The Lord is coming, always coming. When you have ears to hear and eyes to see, you will recognise him at any moment of your life. Life is Advent; life is recognising the coming of the Lord. (Henri Nouwen)

After the Christmas of 2020 where a number of us would have been isolating, or in lockdown or for a number of reasons unable to see family over the Christmas period there is a move or a sense towards (if we are able to) making the most of this year. But what does "making the most of Advent and Christmas" look like for us? It may help to consider Advent as a time where we remember that Jesus was made man and came into our 'neighbourhood', just as it was. Whatever we have or wherever we find

ourselves this Advent and Christmas time we have God with us and the Hope that this brings. I would encourage you to pause and reflect on what Nouwen prompts us to consider - what can or should we bring from our Advent preparations into our daily lives, as I'm not sure that many of us want to bring the pressure and busyness, but may benefit from some stillness and joy in relationships with others.
