Robert Halfon MP writes:

Dear Resident,

The evenings are beginning to get lighter and the days longer, which means spring must be on its way. I am working hard for Harlow, Sheering and the villages on local issues about which I want to update you.

Education, Skills and Apprenticeships

My passion has always been championing education, skills and apprenticeships. I have recently been delighted to host my annual jobs fair with over 60 employers and 4,000 visitors, carry out my 100th visit to Harlow College since being elected to see the advanced manufacturing centre and celebrate the news that over 8,000 new apprenticeships have been created in our town since 2010. I am proud that Harlow

and the villages have so many chances for young people to climb the ladder of opportunity.

Potholes

Like many local residents, I am frustrated by the state of our roads. Following a winter of freezing temperatures, causing damage and breaks in the tarmac, our roads are worse than ever. I have spoken extensively to Highways portfolio holder, Cllr Lee Scott, who has confirmed that Essex County Council has invested £9 million for highway and footway repair. This funding will kick start repairs across Harlow, Sheering and the villages; however, I am pledging to do all I can to ensure the repair and management of Harlow's roads is sustainable. I will continue to work hard to

push Essex further and ensure Harlow roads are repaired.

ULEZ (Ultra Low Emission Zone)

I am campaigning against the Labour Mayor of London's plans to expand the ULEZ. This discriminatory tax will cost many Sheering motorists £12.50 every time they enter London at a time when every penny counts. I am disappointed that the Mayor has reportedly overlooked consultation responses, ignoring the views of hard working people, to push ahead his plans to impose the additional charges. I am inviting everybody to join the campaign, urging the Mayor to scrap his plans and protect the livelihoods of Harlow and Sheering drivers.

Police Advice on using e-scooters

What is an e-scooter?

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Which means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters including the need to have a licence, insurance and tax.

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces. If you're using a private e-scooter you risk the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for no insurance.

If you cause serious harm to another person whilst riding an e-scooter the incident will be investigated in the same way it would if you were riding a motorcycle or driving a car.

Legal use of an e-scooter

It's legal to use an escooter on private land with the permission of the land owner.

Where a trial rental scheme is running, it's legal to use a rental escooter on a public road or cycle lane, provided you have the correct licence and follow road traffic regulations.

Penalties and offences

If you don't have a licence, or the correct licence, or are riding without insurance you could face a Fixed Penalty notice with a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for having no insurance.

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Future Proposals for the Village Hall

We have a great facility but it is currently tired, in need of substantial repairs and improvements

Our aims are:

- To carry out essential repairs and improvements to make it fit for purpose that will maximise its potential and make it a facility that benefits our whole community
- To have an administrative system that is robust, that protects our trustees from liability and that is run effectively and efficiently so that it doesn't waste money unnecessarily, that makes money and puts it back into the building for the benefit of community
- To have a facility that is the centre of village life; that brings our community together and that we are proud to be a part of

Short term plans

To provide an adequate number of toilet facilities to serve the small and large hall independently

This will:

- Include a disabled toilet which should be provided in a modern day facility
- Upgrade the existing toilets and drainage system which are dated and block during high demand
- Provide a separate toilet facility for the Pre School to use off the main hall, which will meet both Safeguarding and Ofsted rules.
- Allow for the two halls to operate independently and increase usage of the facility

We also intend to improve the heating so that it is reliable and effective; and carry out works to repair the roof

Longer Term Plans

We want a hall that is fit for purpose and meets the needs and aspirations of the community.

We would like to know what is important to our community and what facilities and activities you would like to see at your village hall.

We will have a stand at the Coronation Big Lunch event where we will be very pleased to hear your thoughts.

Raising the Funds

The Committee will be bidding for external funding from everywhere we can to raise money for the repairs and improvements to the hall.

However, successful bids are often dependent on us being able to demonstrate community

engagements and 'self help'. So we hope that we can rely on residents to initiate events, support and attend fundraising activities that will add directly to the funds and maximise our opportunities for successful outside bids too.

We are looking to carry out a number of fundraising activities in the near future including a Race Night and Bingo which we hope will be successful and enjoyable - watch out for further publicity.

A new robust administrative system

It is proposed that we change our administrative arrangements from a Registered Charity to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). We believe that this will move us to being a more robust administration, providing suitable protection for trustees and will make us more likely to be successful in winning external funding.

We are also proposing a new booking and online payment system for the hall. This will be a simple, efficient process for customers and our account management.

Bringing the Community Together

We want to rejuvenate the hall to create a vibrant modern facility that will bring the whole community together.

Some committee members are looking to step down and we therefore need a new tranche of people to take on certain roles and responsibilities. Use of Air Rifles

The law makes no distinction between air rifles and more powerful guns for which you need a licence – they are all classed as

firearms. This means that any offence you commit can carry a very heavy penalty, and there are at least 38 different offences. Following this code will help you to keep on the right side of the law, but if you have any doubt, seek advice from BASC or your local police firearms licensing department.

Who Can Shoot

18 years or older: If you are 18 years or older there are no restrictions on buying an air rifle and ammunition, and you can use it wherever you have permission to shoot.

14-17 years: You Can:

borrow an air rifle and ammunition; use an air rifle, without supervision, on private premises where you have permission.

You Cannot

buy or hire an air rifle, or ammunition, or receive one as a gift. Your air rifle and ammunition must be bought and looked after by someone over 18 – normally your parent, guardian or some other responsible adult; have an air rifle in a public place unless you are supervised by somebody aged 21 or over, and you have a reasonable excuse to do so (for example, while on the way to a shooting ground).

Under 14 years

You Can:

use an air rifle under supervision on private premises with permission from the occupier – normally the owner or tenant. The person who supervises you must be at least 21 years old.

You Cannot

buy, hire or receive an air rifle or its ammunition as a gift, or shoot, without adult supervision.

Parents or guardians who buy an air rifle for use by someone under the age of 14 must exercise control over it at all times, even in the home or garden.

It is illegal to sell an air rifle or ammunition to a person under 18 years of age.

Where you can shoot

Where you intend to shoot, always ensure that you are authorised by the landowner or person with the sporting rights and that you know precisely where the boundaries are.

Get permission in writing, if possible, to

remove any doubt. Whenever you are in a public place you should carry the rifle in a gunslip and always ensure that it is unloaded and not cocked.

Noise Nuisance and Anti-Social Behaviour

Noise disturbance is by far the most common type of anti-social behaviour reported to the police, local authorities and housing associations; nearly every aspect of anti-social behaviour involves some level of noise, whether it be loud music, parties, alcohol related disorder, foul and abusive language to name but a few.

If the noise is neighbour related, the first step wherever possible should always be to approach your neighbour to explain the problem, how it impacts you and try to resolve amicably before turning to the Police or other Authorities. People often do not realise the impact that their behaviour is having on others and are more likely to put things right when asked in a reasonable way.

If resolving issues informally is not successful or is inappropriate, then your next course of action may be to contact the Local Authorities Environmental Health Team for investigating neighbour noise nuisance e.g. loud music, barking dogs, unreasonable DIY. You will usually be expected to complete a noise nuisance diary so that officers can assess the level of noise, its frequency and duration, and impact that it is having on your life.

Anti-social behaviour does not always involve noise related issues. It could be an action by someone else that leaves you feeling alarmed, harassed or distressed. It also includes fear of crime or concern for public safety, public disorder or public nuisance.

If the issue is an emergency and you require immediate help, you should call the Police on 999.

In other cases, your concerns may be more appropriately dealt with Epping Forest District Council or by other community safety partner agencies, such as social housing landlords. You can report cases of anti-social behaviour to the Council online and they will assess the best steps to be taken and liaise with other agencies where appropriate.

Chairman's report: Investigation into the proposed Lower Sheering Community Facility

As the new Chairman of Sheering Parish Council, I decided to carry out a review of the available documentation proposing a Community Facility in Lower Sheering. At the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, I was delighted to find past copies of Sheering News dating from August 1977.

Lo and behold, a few pages in, there was a letter from a resident: Bridget Baxter from Lower Sheering.

'Our desire for a small Community Room stems from necessity – not pride. We aim to get a few of the community services which we entirely lack, within the reach of as large a section of the community as possible.

A small room to cater for about 50 people could be used for medical, chiropody, antenatal, young wives club, Tufty Club, to teach our toddlers safety first, Youth activities, including guiding and scouting in all its forms etc.'.

Harry Langton, a parish councillor replied: 'Building a centre necessitates finding land. The planning department will insist that a parking space for cars must be provided for any centre.

The land in front of the playing field is not suitable for technical reasons.

Villages have a time honoured way of dealing with this kind of proposition i.e. call a public meeting which could test the need for a centre and be the means of providing volunteers to bring the idea to fruition.

A voluntary run community bus could make this project unnecessary and provide other benefits. Why not consider this alternative?' So the search has continued for an appropriate

During recent years, the Railway Tavern has shut and has been sold to developers. This was a place where Lower Sheering residents had voted for some years and has resulted in residents either having to travel to Sheering Village Hall to vote or using the postal voting system. For such a large, rural population, this has been viewed as unacceptable by the community and they would like the opportunity to vote in person.

Facilities have been sought in Lower Sheering, but none has been found of a suitable size and location. Also, for a polling station to function, EFDC must provide officers to man the station from 6.00am until past 10.00pm at night. Obviously, economies have been made by centralising the voting facility in Sheering Village Hall.

If a facility for voting was provided in Lower Sheering, unless located centrally to Sheering Lower Road, those less able to walk and vote in person would still need to drive or be driven to the voting station. Parking would need to be provided.

The solution to this rarely occurring occasion would be to find a building in Lower Sheering large enough to accommodate several cars temporarily during the polling day. We have investigated using facilities in The Maltings but EFDC in their inspection said they were unsuitable.

For many years – since the new hall in Sheering Village was built in 1974, the residents of Lower Sheering have looked for "A small room to cater for about 50 people". The original functions stated above in Ms Baxter's letter no longer exist in the local community either through lack of interest, centralisation of facilities or a changing society. During the past 50 years, with the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) compliance written into planning law for new build, provision of ramps, disabled parking spaces and toilet facilities has taken more space in the footprint of a building and the provision of a building for 50 people would not be small in area. The redevelopment of Waterside Place and The Railway Tavern gave the opportunity for the provision of a S106 agreement whereby the developers would provide for Lower Sheering a community facility which seems to now be described as a room with a tea point, disabled toilet and some storage. Councillor Waller negotiated with the developers and a





scheme was put together as shown on the attached drawings.

This was offered to the Parish Council in 2016. Drawings are also in the possession of Sheering PC. The proposal was reviewed by the then

Lower Sheering Parish Councillors and was rejected (much to Cllr Waller's disappointment) on the grounds that the area was too small to



meet their needs. The Councillors in question decided to opt for the alternative and a \$106 unilateral agreement (financial

contribution), made solely by the developers (unilateral) was set up, the wording of which can only be altered by the developers themselves. It states that the funding should be used towards the provision of a community facility in the Lower Sheering area. It does not specify new build. Just to clarify - Lower Sheering Ward extends from the motorway bridge on The Street Sheering to Mayfield's bakery and along Sawbridgeworth Road towards Hatfield Heath.

It had already been established over many years that no site in Lower Sheering, belonging to the Parish Council, was suitable for the provision of a building due to "technical reasons" as stated by Harry Langton in 1977. However, during recent years, the land adjacent to the playground has been mooted as the site to be used for a community room. The local population, without the prior knowledge of the site constraints, have been led to believe that this was an appropriate site. Further investigations by a chartered civil engineer have shown that there is a 100m diameter public sewer running through the middle of the site serving the bungalows adjacent to the site and joining their foul sewer into Sheering Lower Road. It runs from a manhole to the rear of the adjacent bungalow to the left of the proposed site, to a manhole at the centre of the site adjacent to the road and is owned by Thames Water.

In order to build near a public sewer, an approved build over agreement is required. In the paragraph within the documentation, guidance is given for "Specifications for approved build over agreements – sewers up to 160mm diameter. Point 3 states: New dwellings are not permitted to be constructed over the public sewer". This therefore necessitates a sewer diversion and the costs associated with that work.

There are also many easements (rights of way) across the site, confirmed by EFDC and they have stated that it would be financially prohibitive to release these.

Further investigations into the site with Nicola Sayers, the senior technical and legal officer for Estate and Land at EFDC, and

investigations into past minutes of meetings indicate that the piece of land in question does not belong to Sheering Parish Council but to EFDC and a lease should have been put in place around the year 2000 for its renewal. Owing to the cost, the then Parish Council refused to renew but continued to maintain the land including spending over £3000 to replace the surrounding fencing early last year. In order to continue use of the land for the community, EFDC require up to £2000 for legal fees to set up a lease. Conditions of this would be that no temporary construction could take place on the site because its use could disturb neighbours. The only use could be for a seating and planted area. Is this something local residents would like?

Parking would also be unacceptable on the site as EFDC want to keep their existing green areas green.

The question has then arisen as to whether it would be acceptable to place a community building on the existing playing field/ playground. There would be no access across the EFDC land on Sheering Lower Road. The land to the rear of the play area is Ladywell Prospect. There is a private car park adjoining the basketball area. This would be the only vehicular access to the site, but it is private land and permission would have to be obtained from local residents. The highways pathway from Sheering Lower Road is not wide enough for fire engine access to the rear playground making the site unviable.

It is possible to put an outline planning application in to EFDC, but this is very unlikely to succeed as the leasing department have already expressed their negativity on this idea due to disturbance to their tenants on Sheering Lower Road.

£74,000 in S106 monies is in an earmarked account with the Parish Council. Unless a site becomes available, or another acceptable use can be found within the parameters, the money will sit there depreciating. It may be that the area adjacent to the J7a M11 junction will have land available as part of the expanding development, but that is not local to the current density of population around Sheering Lower Road although it is within the Lower Sheering Ward.

It may be that the only solution to this is to call a public meeting for residents to have formal sight of documentation and further discussions can take place with our County Councillor present as to the possible options going forward.

The Hundred Parishes Society

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) recently published analysis of the 2021 Census. Nationally, this showed that the population of England



grew by 6% in the last 10 years and 14% over the last 20 years. Locally, the increase has been much faster. The population of The Hundred Parishes in 2021 was around 156,000, up 12% since 2011 and 24% since 2001. If roads seem busier, these extra 30,000 people are a major factor.

Half of the increase is accounted for by 6 parishes close to Stansted Airport. Elsenham, Flitch Green, Great Dunmow, Little Canfield, Stansted Mountfitchet and Takeley have each expanded by more than 50% in the last 20 years. Another big growth was seen in Buntingford: from 4,300 in 2001 to 7,900 in 2021.

The Census is the modern equivalent of the Domesday Book produced in 1086 AD when the national population was less than 2 million, compared to 60 million today.

Today, 8% of the Hundred Parishes population was born outside the UK (compared to 17% in the whole of England and Wales); 10% of homes are flats (v 22%); 36% of houses have 4 or more bedrooms (v 21%); 27% of homes are rented (v 37%); 40% of adults work at home (v 31%); 55% are in professional or managerial jobs (v 46%); 56% of households have 2 or more vehicles (v 35%). We have a different age mix to the UK average, with a shortfall of around 5,000 people in their 20s and 30s offset by around 5,000 extra people aged over 40.

While the previous paragraph highlights contrasts, some statistics are closely aligned with the national picture: 99% of households have central heating; 5% of households have a second home; 51% of the population is female and 49% male.

Voter ID



From 4 May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections.

This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections. Voters will have to show photo ID at their polling station in order to cast their vote.

Practically any photo ID will do from passports and driving licenses to bus passes. It won't even need to be in date so long as the photo is still a reasonable likeness.

Voter Authority Certificate

If you do not have any acceptable photo ID, and want to vote at the polling station, you will need to apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate. This can be done now so you have it sorted ready for the elections on 4 May 2023.

This can be done online until 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023 ready for the May 2023 election.

Apply online at GOV.uk for Voter Authority Certificate

Voters who do not produce a Voter Authority Certificate, or valid photo identification will not be allowed to vote on the day.

Alternatively, you can access a paper copy of the application form either from the Electoral Commission website or by contacting the elections team by at

If you are registered to vote by post, the Voter ID requirements don't apply.

District Councillors Report Lower Sheering

Thanks to Sheering News for the opportunity to update you on Epping Forest District Council (EFDC) matters over the past few months.

Traffic

From my own experience and from your e-mails and phone calls, the increase in traffic volume and disruption caused by the new M11 junction continues to cause concern. I am in regular dialogue with colleagues at the County Council and Essex Highways about this. I know from those discussions that the problem is being taken seriously and a lasting solution sought. Our local MP Robert Halfon is also taking a keen interest and I hope there will be positive news soon.

Anti-Social Behaviour

I have also been working with our Community Safety Unit and Essex Police to tackle anti-social behaviour in Lower Sheering. A range of measures are in place to ensure that those who cause such damage and distress are brought to account. I am always willing to take such incidents up with the relevant authorities on your behalf.

The Epping Forest Local Plan 2011-2033.

EFDC has now received the Inspector's final report on the examination of the Local Plan. This sets out the Inspector's recommendations and the reasons for them and completes the examination process. The Inspector concludes that subject to the Main Modifications set out in the appendix to the report, the District's Local Plan is sound and capable of

adoption. This gives us a solid basis for future planning and development decisions.

Council Tax

For the coming year, EFDC has once again proposed the lowest district element of Council Tax of any authority in Essex. Local Authority finances are under extreme pressure, but we remain committed to maintaining public services whilst making real-terms cuts in our budget. Investment remains a priority and the new Epping Leisure Centre, North Weald vehicle depot and a new fleet of refuse and recycling lorries are just some of the projects being backed in 2023/2024.

The Coronation of King Charles III

The EFDC website contains guidance for street parties for the Coronation. The Council aim to make obtaining permission as simple as possible so that neighbours may come together to celebrate on 6 May.

Local elections will be taking place on 4 May and you should be aware that photo I.D. will be required in order to vote. A full list of acceptable forms of I.D. is available on the Electoral Commission website along with instructions on how to obtain a Voter Authority Certificate if you need one. Postal votes are not affected.

On the subject of elections. sadly it seems likely that Lower Sheering will cease to exist as a distinct council ward from May 2024 following Boundary Commission changes. Their proposals place Sheering and Lower Sheering with many small rural settlements in a large 'Rural East' ward with 3 councillors. I consider this to be a flawed decision and EFDC have suggested that Sheering and Lower Sheering be taken out of 'Rural East' to become a single ward with one councillor. At the time of writing we await a final decision from the Boundary Commission.



Other Recent Events

Recent? It seems an age ago since St Mary's Brass put on a varied programme for Carols and Mulled Wine in the Village Hall on 9 December, ably compered by Philip Taylor. The sausage rolls and mince pies went down very well too. We are proud to have raised £300 in support of church charities that are providing food, medicine and shelter for people in Ukraine (not just Christians) who have been internally displaced because of the war.

St Mary's Brass were in action again in The Cock pub on 19 December for a Christmas singalong which was another joyful introduction to the Christmas season. £62 was donated to Friends of St Mary's. The Sunday before Christmas there was an appreciative congregation for the candlelit carol service. Hearty congregational singing, and some beautiful anthems from St Mary's choir, were interspersed with traditional readings. So atmospheric and yet another wonderful way of preparing for Christmas.

Churchyard Extension

We are deeply disappointed to have to report yet again that - apparently due to a huge backlog - the Land Registry has still not issued documentation which is necessary before we can petition the Bishop to consecrate the new churchyard extension for burials. As you may know, we initiated the project early in 2018, never dreaming it would take so long. Since then we have fulfilled all the requirements within our power (planning permission for change of use, fencing,

clearing and levelling the ground, etc), and the transfer document was actually signed on 28 May 2021.

As we write we are beginning to explore a different way forward which has been suggested to us by the lawyers handling the transfer. We are very grateful for the expressions of support from the Parish Council and others, and we will of course keep you updated.

Meanwhile there are still a few spaces remaining for burials, and no shortage of space for the interment of ashes.

Churchyard team

The December meet was short and chilly, followed by festive lunch in the Church Room. It was hard to choose the best bit – the



Christmas jumpers, the paper hats, the terrible jokes, the pickled cabbage, the trifle, and lots more – a great time.

The ground was too frost-hard to do any maintenance in January, but now we are back in the swing of meeting every few weeks on a Saturday morning. Could you help, especially in the Summer when the grass grows at an alarming rate? If so, contact Natalie Cracknell on 01279 734360 for more information.

Eco-church

On the first Saturday of the month at eleven o'clock we hold a bug and bird hunt. We have our own "bug hotel" (on the south wall of the Church Room) and of course the setting is our large churchyard where many insects, birds and mammals thrive. We have bats, owls, butterflies and moths and the most amazing shiny beetles. Last summer over eighty species of moths, including recent colonists to Essex, were identified by experts who carried out a nocturnal survey. The results were submitted to a County recording scheme run by the Essex Field Club and will be available on the national database. We plan to do a re-run this Summer, so watch out for the posters.

Meanwhile why not join us on the next St Mary's bug and bird safari and maybe be the first to spot a new-to-us species!

The Hundred Parishes Society

As the weather warms, we look forward to an abundance of flowers offering food for bees, hoverflies and butterflies.

The reasons for this decline are complex, but as most arable crops are grown without any weeds this reduces the variety of food supplies for caterpillars, aphids and bugs. Fewer flowers mean less food for bees, adult butterflies and moths.

Fortunately, many insect species are resilient, and we can help with the survival of some. I encourage you to plant up your gardens with native hedgerow shrubs, a

tree or two and install a bug

There are many helpful guides to creating a wildlife garden; the RHS website is helpful as is *Gardening for Wildlife* by Adrian Thomas published by Bloomsbury in 2017. Bumble Bees

A report by the Essex Wildlife Trust indicates that such sightings may be much reduced. During 2022, members of the Trust participated in the UK citizen science Bugs

Matter Survey, recording 'bug splats' on vehicle number plates to monitor flying insect abundance. The numbers of insects recorded on 277 journeys across Essex suggested that insect numbers have declined by 60% since 2004.

This is a worrying trend as it has implications for the survival of many other organisms. The majority of plants rely on insect pollinators to set seed including wild and garden flowers and three quarters of our food crops. Many songbirds feed on insects, and seed eaters such as skylarks and house sparrows nourish their young on insects.


We have continued to celebrate all of our successes in our Team assemblies (with Friends and Families) on Fridays.



County Councillor Chris Whitbread Reports: 2023 has got off to a busy start and has gone by so quickly... I can't believe we are about to enter Spring! Despite the cold whether it is

lovely to see the Snowdrops and Crocus begin to sprout.

There have been many meetings and events

across the local area in recent months which I have attended as your local County Councillor. As well as attending meetings I have also been reporting local issues, including highways defects. I am pleased to see some of the potholes I reported under my

see some of the potholes I reported under my 'Member pothole allocation' (18 in phase two) have started to be repaired, although the Winter months have created many more. I have been working hard to raise issues in relation to the impact of Junction 7a on the village. Even prior to the opening of the junction last year local residents were raising concerns over it's impact, indeed when I joined Robert Halfon in December for his surgery this was the largest concern raised. I have been raising these concerns with the

Cabinet Member for Highways and officers at Essex County Council. A meeting to discuss

potential actions with the Parish Council and

Robert Halfon is being arranged and to help

these discussions further surveys were commissioned on traffic flows. Alongside this I am speaking with residents about the problems on a regular basis and I have also brought the Cabinet Member for Highways to see the issues first hand.

In February Essex County Council held their Annual Budget Meeting, which I was proud to present as the Cabinet Member for Finance. The Conservative led Council listened to the views of local people in shaping this year's budget. Despite considerable financial pressures, because of spiralling inflation caused by Putin's illegal war in Ukraine, the Council has brought forward a balanced budget with additional investment in top local priorities including highways and social care. It was announced that there would be an extra £9 million to improve roads and pavements across Essex, this is a move which will please all Essex residents, who have noticed increased defects to local roads caused by the recent bout of cold weather . I will work hard to fight to ensure North Weald and Nazeing Division, which includes Sheering, gets its fair share! Also at the Full Council County Council meeting, I was pleased to see it confirmed



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that Essex County Council strongly opposes the ULEZ (Ultra Low Emission Zone) expansion and will not allow any supporting signage on the Essex land.

On a District Council related subject, a number of residents have contacted me about issues with Waste Collection, where a number of collections have been missed. The Cabinet Member for Waste, Councillor Nigel Avey and I, as Leader of the Council met with representatives of BIFFA (Waste Collectors) in January to challenge them on their recent poor performance. This is disappointing when they provided such good service during the pandemic where many other councils failed with waste collections. To get them back on track I instructed that several steps were taken including additional waste collections and improved communications with both the council and residents... good progress is now being made at completing the backlog. Actions are also being taken to review the situation for the longer term and ensure residents get the service which they deserve. If you still have any uncollected waste, please get in touch with me on cllr.chris.whitbread@essex.gov.uk and I will get this reported.

As we look ahead to the middle of the year, we are all looking forward to celebrating the King's Coronation. It includes advice about support with money, debt and benefits, and help with energy, childcare and household costs.




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Bookings for Recycling Centres

From Monday 13 March 2023, residents visiting Essex County Council (ECC) recycling centres will need to book in advance.

A booking system will be trialled for all vehicles visiting ECC recycling centres to help manage waiting times, reduce

congestion, and improve the customer experience.

The booking process has already been trialled for all vehicles using Rayleigh Recycling Centre, and also for large vehicles using the nine van-friendly sites.

Both trials have been effective in smoothing the pattern of demand across operating hours and reducing queues and congestion both in and around the sites.

Blue Badge holders do not need to book a slot.

Pedestrians and cyclists carrying waste from their own home are also not required to book. For safety reasons, we advise that cyclists either queue as a vehicle (for example, if they are towing a small trailer) or dismount and enter through the pedestrian gate. Cyclists can either walk their bike onsite using the pedestrian walkways, or cycle via the vehicle access areas.

Please note, any resident that parks a vehicle outside and attempts to walk waste in will be

refused entry. This does not apply to cyclists.

How to make a booking

There is no charge to book, but you need to make a booking each time you visit. Please remember, recycling centres only accept household waste.

When making the booking, you will be able to select the recycling centre you wish to visit. Once you have chosen your recycling centre, a calendar will appear displaying the time slots. Fully booked slots will be greyed out, and available slots will be green. You can

also view the capacity of each slot in the



bottom right-hand corner of the time slot so you can see how busy each slot is.

Once your booking is complete

you will receive a confirmation email. Please bring the booking confirmation and proof of address. Only residents of the Essex County Council area will be allowed access.

If you have limited internet or accessibility issues that may restrict you from booking your slot online, there are alternative options to book a slot. In the first instance, could you receive assistance from a friend, family member, colleague, carer or neighbour? Alternatively, you can phone the Essex County Council contact centre on 0345 743 0430 Monday to Friday, 8:30 to 5:00 who will make the booking on your behalf.

Please note:

- Booking slots will be made available for a maximum of two weeks in advance.
- Bookings cannot be made on the same day.
 Bookings will close a day in advance to
- Allow for detailed lists to be provided to the sites and administrative teams.
- •To ensure fair usage, we ask residents to

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enquiries@drobinson.co.uk www.drobinson.co.uk try and limit visits to one booking per week. This is just a guide and the booking system does not restrict multiple bookings.

- Bookings for cars will have a 15 minute timeslot. You can arrive at your designated recycling centre at any point within this timeslot.
- A booking slot does not allow priority access. If you arrive and there is a queue, please do not try and skip the queue as you will be refused access.
- Any residents that park up outside and attempt to walk waste in will be reported and refused entry.
- If you miss your slot, you may need to book another slot to visit on another day.

If you would like to cancel your booking, the booking confirmation email will contains a link called 'return to my booking'. If you click this link, you will be able to follow instructions to cancel your booking.

If you live in Sheering or Lower Sheering you are resident in Essex even though your postal address includes Bishop's Stortford or Sawbridgeworth both of which are in Hertfordshire! Use Essex in your address when booking.

News from Eden Surgery

Appointments Summary

There are two distinct types of appointment –

- reactive patient led requests to see a GP
- proactive practice led pre-booking of appointments for patients with long term conditions.

Reactive Appointments

- We offer acute/urgent appointments for patients requiring same day care.
- We do not provide emergency care this requires a 999 call

Proactive appointments:

We are contracted to continually manage the health of patients with long term conditions and offset the need to use secondary care services. These conditions include:

 frailty – diabetes – cancer - atrial fibrillation blood pressure - learning disability - asthma & COPD - mental health - chronic kidney disease – epilepsy - heart failure - etc Many appointments each month are pre booked in advance to manage long term conditions, reducing the total amount of appointments available before people call in.

Our System

- Appointments are spread out between our 7 GPs, 3 Registrar GPs, & 5 nurses
- Appointments are available Mon Fri 8am to 6.30pm
- We also provide additional appointments on Wednesdays until 8pm, and every Saturday as part of an extended access service that we participate in.
- NHS111 is available for out of hours care.
- Currently our clinicians are fully booked out with back to back appointments for every available clinical session.
- They take on 'extra' appointments after each clinical session to see as many patients as possible, but we have to be aware of safety concerns relating to over working

Our Reception Team

- Our team is trained to ask key questions at the point of contact in order to direct the patient to the most appropriate clinician, or send them to another service as appropriate
- We receive hundreds of calls each day, and at peak times there are still call queues. This is something seen nationally and not specific to Eden
- We are still hoping to upgrade our telephone system to improve functionality and efficiency for incoming callers

Signposting - Additional Clinical Services

 Eden belongs to South Uttlesford Primary Care network (PCN) – including Stansted,

- Elsenham, Angel Lane and John Tasker House practices.
- The PCN provides a range of additional clinical services that are made available at Eden eg muscular skeletal specialists, dieticians, social prescribers, and physician associates.
- These services provide a 'first point of contact' service, sending patients with specific ailments to clinicians with specific skills without using valuable GP time
- Within our locality there are also minor illness, minor eye condition, and respiratory clinics available

Community Pharmacists

- The community pharmacy network is available to address patients with minor ailments and recommend treatment.
- If a pharmacist cannot help then the patient will be referred back to the GP, but there are a wide range of ailments that a pharmacist can assist with.

Development

- We are continually looking at ways to improve the efficiency of appointment management at Eden with services such as online self-booking and e-consult under review.
- We welcome input from the Patient Participation Group at any time with suggestions and observations, and together our aim is to make the service as efficient as possible.
